## **Report of the SELECT BOARD**

This year could be coined as a period of transition as we witnessed the turnover of several long-term positions and the departure of veteran members of Marion Town Staff. We continued our strategic push to address some aging infrastructure and municipal buildings, improve processes and increase our scope of grant funded projects.

**Personnel** – Norman Hills was re-elected to the Select Board for a third three-year term. Our Town Administrator Jay McGrail departed in November of 2022 and was replaced by Geoffrey Gorman in March 2023. Judy Mooney, our long-time Finance Director and Assistant Town Administrator, retired at the end of December and was replaced by Heather O'Brien. Isaac Perry, our Harbormaster, moved on to Mattapoissett and was replaced by Adam Murphy. Annita Donovan in the Payroll and Benefits Office retired and was replaced by Melissa Frappier.

**Lockheed Martin** – The property was purchased this year and reimagined as the Sippican Office Park. The new owner is working closely with the Town to lease the existing buildings, bring new vibrant commercial enterprise to the Town as well as determine the potential uses for the remainder of the undeveloped property.

### **Town Property/Facilities**

- Town House – The old Town Clerk's Office was renovated by the Facilities Department and the Town Clerk moved back in. The office looks tremendous, and the Facilities team did a magnificent job. A new underground electrical service was run, and a new generator was installed, allowing the Town House to remain in operation during storm events. The Facilities Department constructed a soundproof workspace in the updated basement providing a new maintenance area left open since the sale of Atlantis Drive. As the year closed, the Facilities Department was busy refurbishing and returning the basement stairs to their original and historical glory.
- Harbormaster Building – Design was completed and funding from Town Meeting and the Seaport Economic Council resulted in a successful bidding process and the award of a construction contract to a local construction company, South Coast Improvement. Site preparation activities started in December.
- Department of Public Works (DPW) Building – The design has coalesced into a single metal skin building and cost estimates are being refined. The goal is to bring the final bid price to Town Meeting in May 2024.
- Benjamin D. Cushing Community Center – The Facilities Department completed preliminary foundation work for new storage addition at the back of the Community Center. The pavilion received electrical service, lighting, and fans with support from the Friends of Marion Council on Aging.
- Bicentennial Park – The Facilities Department removed the aging gazebo and built a fabulous replacement.
- Elizabeth Taber Library – The bannisters to the Natural History Museum were heightened to meet safety requirements while maintaining their historic design.

- Holmes Woods – With the help of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD), a survey for potential uses was conducted and a public meeting conducted to review the results. Consensus was to improve for passive recreation. A Forester has been contracted to help with a Forest Stewardship Plan and Bird Assessment to assist in final planning.
- Grants - The Town received three Community Compact Grant Grants supporting update of the new Town Website (live in January 2024), funding to conduct a human resource and policy review and a final grant to support digitizing and preserving our historical records.
- Bike Paths – We met significant milestones for construction of two Marion Share Use Paths. The first, on Point Road, is nearing completion with gravel installation to occur in early 2024. The Marion Share Use Bike Path, running from the Mattapoissett town line to Point Road completed a 100% design review and is funded for construction in 2025.

### Studies

- Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan (CWMP) – Weston and Sampson assisted with the development of the plan which was completed and approved by the Select Board. The 20-year Plan identifies six candidate areas for potential sewer expansion. Implementation of the plan will be integrated into the annual Capital Improvement Plan in the upcoming years.
- Open Space and Recreation Plan (OSRP) – The OSRP was completed with assistance from the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD) and submitted to the Commonwealth. The plan was conditionally approved with comments that are in the resolution process. We expect to get a fully approved plan in 2024.
- Route 6 – We are waiting for detailed update of the study and plans from the Commonwealth. Currently the project is not at the 25% phase and has not been selected for funding.
- Pedestrian Safety – DPW and the Police Department have been revising a 1979 Speed Regulation to reflect current statutory requirements. We anticipate that the new regulations will allow speed reductions in some areas of the Town.
- Village Parking - SRPEDD assisted in the completion of a parking study for the village area. The study is complete and under review. We anticipate public discussions next year as well as new avenues for grant funding based on the study.

We continue to live in a time of change and challenge, the Select Board continues to strive for decision making that is beneficial to the collective community. Comments and ideas are always welcome.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Select Board and the Department Heads and Staff in the Town for their tremendous support and patience as I started the new role. I credit each and every one of them with my ability to be successful starting out with the middle of the budget cycle and Town Meeting and ending with groundbreaking at our new Harbormaster Facility. I would like to specifically call out Donna Hemphill and Judy Mooney for their extraordinary assistance during my transition. They kept the wheels of municipal government turning during the absence of a Town Administrator and were instrumental in my rapid transition into the role.

In addition, I thank the residents of Marion for their open-armed welcome and cooperation as I peppered them all for history, good stories, and the best places to get lunch. I am grateful to have such a community to work with as we continue to make Marion the best it can be.

In 2023, we were able to get three major projects on the glideslope for completion. We also completed the 100% design submission for the Shared Use Path and finalized the design and layout of the new Department of Public Works Operations Building. These milestones were only possible with the unwavering support of numerous staff and volunteer board members. I thank them all for their time, energy, and insight.

Lastly, I would like to take this opportunity to thank Judy Mooney, the Finance Director and Assistant Town Administrator for her many years of service to the Town of Marion. She retired at the end of 2023 after 20 years with the Town. In addition, Annita Donovan, the Payroll and Benefits Coordinator, also retired after almost 20 years of service. We wish them both the best in their future endeavors. Heather O'Brien assumed the role as our new Finance Director and Melissa Frappier assumed the role as our new Human Resources Manager. We are happy to have them both onboard.

**Report of the  
BOARD OF ASSESSORS**

To the Honorable Select Board:

As mandated by State Law, the major responsibilities of the Board in Fiscal Year 2023 were to manage the valuation and assessment of all real and personal property for *ad valorem* tax purposes, to set the tax rate, act upon applications for abatements, place value on new construction, and commit motor vehicle and boat excise taxes.

A single tax rate for all classes of property was set at \$9.44 per \$1,000 of valuation.

The following information is a recapitulation of the Town’s assessment and tax levies for Fiscal Year 2023:

Property exempt from taxation had a total value of \$212,908,323. The tax value of new construction was \$124,665.00. The Board committed \$1,009,835.75 in Motor Vehicle Excise Taxes. Excise Taxes on Boats habitually moored in Marion were \$77,849.00. The commitment for the Community Preservation Fund was \$372,341.53.

We update our online property value database hosted by MapGeo annually. MapGeo provides access to digital geographic and property data and works closely with MassGIS to make sure our property records conform to MassGIS standards. Using MapGeo, Town employees as well as taxpayers can easily search for properties by owner’s name and/or address, view and print property record cards, overlay a MassGIS aerial photo and/or a FEMA Map onto a property, and view Neighborhood and Water Factor Maps. In 2023, we printed our digital mapping application of the FEMA Flood Zone Maps onto our paper maps stored in our office. These Maps are available to the public to view at any time. Abatement Applications,

various Assessor's Forms and Applications, and additional helpful information are also available on our webpage located on the Town's Website at [marionma.gov](http://marionma.gov) under Government.

The Board thanks Linda Dessert, M.A.A., Associate Assessor and Cynthia M. Visotski, C.A.A., our Assistant Assessor, for their dedication, work ethic and knowledge of State Assessing Laws and of the responsibilities required of the Board. We are especially grateful for the respect and courtesy they extend to all the Marion residents and real estate professionals that call or visit our office.

The Board meets regularly on the First and Third Wednesdays of the month at 5:15 P.M., and at other times by appointment. We encourage voters to meet with members of the Board at anytime to express their value-related concerns. ## **Report of PLANNING BOARD**

To the Honorable Select Board:

The Marion Planning Board works toward sound municipal management, sustainable land use, protection of natural resources, efficient and affordable transportation, a diverse housing stock, public safety, economic development, clean energy, a healthy community, an informed public, and equity and opportunity among people of all backgrounds.

This year, Marion's Planning Board continues to make effective and judicious decisions for the orderly growth and development of the community, and we are pleased to submit the following report of our work for the year ending December 31, 2023.

The Planning Board performed site plan reviews and permitting activity across commercial, institutional and residential sectors over the past year. New development and reuse of existing buildings took place on commercial and institutional properties.

The Planning Board conducted pre-submission conferences, definitive site plan reviews, and site plan review hearings for both the new Department of Public Works (DPW) Building and the new Harbormaster Building, among others.

The Planning Board reviewed several Approval Not Required plans for lot line changes, land swaps between adjacent parcels, or the creation of new lots. The Planning Board reviewed proposed subdivisions, proposed zoning changes, and made recommendations to the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Marion's Master Plan remains the guiding document for use in the Planning Board's official activities as we consider Marion's future, particularly, housing options, resiliency, and transportation. We are grateful for the participation and ideas offered by our neighbors as we continue to work to seamlessly link north Marion with the harbor and Village area.

The Planning Board continues pursuing Master Plan goals:

- A bylaw subcommittee continues working to resolve bylaw codification issues while integrating Master Plan goals.
- The Planning Board continues its efforts to integrate the diverse concepts of growth, open space and resiliency while preserving the town's character.
- The Board continues to strive to find a balance between more affordable housing and quality open space protection.
- The Transportation and Circulation Task Force (TCTF) seeks to address improvements on our local roads and to determine viable options to calm Route 6 traffic.

As with previous years, 2023 was marked by productive and collaborative relationships among a variety of other Town boards and committees. Planning Board members continue to play an active role as members of several Town and regional committees, including the Community Preservation

Committee, Transportation and Circulation Task Force Committee, the Energy Management Committee, and the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District.

One member attended several Citizen Planner Training Collaborative (CPTC) courses held online. The CPTC is a collaboration of citizens, nonprofits and government agencies dedicated to providing advanced training to citizens involved in municipal planning and land use.

The May 2023, the Town election resulted in the reelection of Eileen Marum, and the election of new members, Ryan Burke and W. Dale Jones.

The Board reorganized with Tucker Burr elected Chairman, Andrew Daniel elected Vice-Chairman, and Eileen J. Marum elected Clerk.

## Report of DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

To the Honorable Select Board:

I am pleased to submit the 2023 Annual Report of the Department of Public Works (DPW). The following is a summary of accomplishments and work performed in 2023.

### **HIGHWAY DIVISION**

**Operations** – Highway Division staff continue to utilize a work order system to schedule and track daily activities. We try to schedule our daily tasks by staffing and priority, but outside unforeseen requests come to the Division often, and sometimes urgent, and our planned tasks need to be rescheduled. The work order system allows us to revise our scheduled day while still tracking tasks remaining to be completed. This system also allows us to track duplicate requests as well as repeat issues.

**Property Maintenance** – With the addition of the Parks & Fields Division, which was previously under the Recreation Department, the DPW is now responsible for regular maintenance of over 73 acres of municipal properties. We supplement our workforce with seasonal employees during the spring/summer months to help with the increased workload. Each property is scheduled to be mowed and trimmed at least weekly. The Division continued to assist the Marion Garden Group with watering the beautification planters at four locations that need safety precautions in place to do so.

Regular property maintenance has continued in the Town's five cemeteries. In addition to this regular maintenance, the Highway Division handles all lot sales, mark-outs, burials, and installation of foundations for gravestones throughout the year. In 2023, there were a total of 46 burials: 18 full burials and 28 cremations.

**Roads** – During the winter months, the primary focus of this Division is ensuring the roads are safe and passable for travel by treating the roads with a sand & salt mixture, plowing when necessary, filling potholes, trimming road edges, and cleaning/repairing drains for the proper drainage on the roads. Potholes continue to be an issue and in total 8 tons of bag patch was used in 2023. A great deal of work has been done trying to keep the roads free of standing water by clearing drains and swales; standing water is not only a hazard to motorists and pedestrians, but it also degrades the pavement. All swales have been identified using GPS coordinates.

Street sign replacements have continued to allow for better identification of all town streets. At the end of 2023, approximately 80% of the signs have been replaced.

The Pavement Management Program continued in 2023. County Road, Joanne Drive and Jenna Drive were paved, and a paving repair was completed on Cove's End Road. P.J. Keating and the Town of Marion were awarded the 2023 Quality in Construction Award by the National Asphalt Pavement Association for the County Road paving project. Crack sealing was completed on 15 roads throughout town. Crack sealing is a cost-effective pavement preservation treatment that extends the life of the pavement by slowing deterioration for many years.

The Town has contracted with The Engineering Corp. (TEC), for pavement inspection and reporting on all town-owned roads. Once completed, the Town will have a database that identifies the current condition of each road, the recommended repairs, a cost-benefit analysis for each road and a 3-year pavement maintenance plan based on the available budget. TEC is also working on a town-wide sidewalk

evaluation which will report on current conditions, recommended repairs, estimated construction costs and prioritization, as well as mapping of all sidewalk locations.

**Rubbish & Recycling** – The DPW continues to manage and operate the Benson Brook Transfer Station for Marion and Rochester residents. The Transfer Station is open on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM. In 2023, a total of 15,485 customers were recorded: 10,440 on Saturdays and 5,045 on Wednesdays. A total of 640.26 tons of material were accepted: 410.37 tons of household rubbish, 59.14 tons of recycling, 112.38 tons of yard waste, and 58.37 tons of metals. Waste Management continues to be under contract for the curbside collection of rubbish and recycling as well as hauling the material collected at the Transfer Station. A total of 1506.62 tons of household rubbish and 498.96 tons of recycling were collected curbside. All municipal rubbish and recycling containers located throughout town are collected twice weekly by the Highway Division. In 2023, approximately 56 tons of material were collected from these 26 containers.

**Stormwater Program** – The Year 5 Annual Report for Massachusetts Small MS4 General Permit (May 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023) was successfully completed and submitted per the USEPA schedule requirements. Highway Division staff are currently working on all mandatory Year 6 activities which include street sweeping and cleaning and catch basin inspections and repairs.

**Capital Equipment** – In 2023, the Division took delivery of a new CAT Skid Steer with multiple attachments. This multi-use compact equipment will assist the DPW in numerous property maintenance/repair tasks throughout the year.

The Division also took delivery of two new F550 trucks with plows. Both trucks are being used during the daily operations of the Highway Division and will be deployed during all snow removal and storm operations.

**Capital Projects** – Saltonstall Architects, with input from the DPW Building Committee, continued work on the design and engineering for the new DPW Operations Building. The Highway Division performed the site clearing at the end of Benson Brook Road. We expect this project will be out to bid early in 2024.

## **WATER DIVISION**

**Operations** – The Water Division staff completed an eight-hour Emergency Response Plan (ERP) training session as required annually by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP). The training course satisfied Training Contact Hours (TCHs) as approved by the Board of Certification of Operators of Drinking Water Facilities.

**Fire Hydrant Replacement Program** - The Water Division issued contract documents and received bid proposals to replace five hydrants in Town as part of the annual Fire Hydrant Replacement Program. Award was made to Speakman Excavating, LLC, who replaced hydrants at the following locations: 33 Allen Street, 19 Holmes Street, 61 Lewis Street, the intersection of Wareham Street (Route 6) and Hermitage Road, and the intersection of Mill Street (Route 6) and Luce Avenue. Construction was completed in the spring of 2023, and the Program will continue in 2024.

**Mattapoisett River Valley Water Treatment Plant (MRVWTP) Upgrades Project** - Design and procurement of the MRVWTP Upgrades Project (Project) continued in 2023. The Project includes replacement of the ultrafiltration system, addition of ultraviolet disinfection system, and upgrades to the Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system at the MRVWTP. The Project is separated into two contracts: No. 1 includes procurement of the ultrafiltration system, and No. 2 includes

procurement and installation of the remainder of the upgrades. Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Program funding was obtained in May 2023 for Contract No. 1, and the District continues work to secure funding for Contract No. 2. Construction is scheduled to begin in 2024, and substantial completion is anticipated for spring 2025.

**Combined Pump Station Chemical Feed Building**– Construction and initial startup of the Combined Pump Station Chemical Feed Building was complete in 2023. The new chemical feed building and associated appurtenances will treat water from the East Well, West Well, and the Mary’s Pond Wellfield. MassDEP final approval and implementation of the facility into the water distribution system is anticipated for spring 2024.

**Wolf Island Road Well and East Well Emergency Backup Generator and the Perry Hill Station and Main Pump Station Generator Replacement** - The Town contracted with Tata & Howard, Inc. to complete engineering design and bidding services for the Wolf Island Road Well and East Well Emergency Backup Generator and the Perry Hill Station and Main Pump Station Generator Replacement project. The Wolf Island Road Well and the East Well currently have a portable generator that will be replaced with a permanent generator. The permanent generator at the East Well will also serve the West Well and the Mary’s Pond Wellfield. The existing generators at the Perry Hill Station and the Main Pump Station will be replaced with new permanent generators, due to their age and expected end of useful life. Emergency generators provide backup power to pump stations and water supply wells should the power supply be interrupted due to a severe storm, maintenance, or other power outage related event. Continuous operation of the pump stations and public water supply wells allow for uninterrupted supply of safe potable water to residents. Construction of the generators is anticipated to begin in July 2024.

**Gate Valve Maintenance and Replacement Program, Main Pump Station Evaluation, and the Perry Hill Pump Station Evaluation** - The Town received funding from the DWSRF Program under the Asset Management Plan Grant Program to complete three asset management projects: Gate Valve Maintenance and Replacement Program, Main Pump Station Evaluation, and the Perry Hill Pump Station Evaluation. The Gate Valve Maintenance and Replacement Program includes an evaluation of all gate valves in the water distribution system and development of a five-year gate valve maintenance program. The Main Pump Station and Perry Hill Pump Station Evaluations will review each station in its entirety, including the chemical feed systems, metering, SCADA/instrumentation, building condition, electrical equipment, options for standby chlorination, valves and VFD’s. The asset management projects are anticipated to be completed in March 2024.

**Unidirectional Flushing (UDF) Plan** - The Town contracted with Tata & Howard, Inc. to complete a (UDF) Plan. The UDF Plan is a sequential program that enables the water distribution system to be flushed from water supply sources to system extremities in an effort to remove typical sediment deposits in the system that may cause discolored water resulting in complaints from customers. The UDF Plan will improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the current hydrant flushing program. It will also work concurrently with the Gate Valve Maintenance and Replacement Program, assist with the overall preventative maintenance of the distribution system, provide critical information about valves and hydrants in the distribution system, and help prioritize future improvements. The UDF Plan was completed in March 2023, and implemented by Water Division staff in September 2023. Approximately ¼ of the water system was flushed before weather conditions no longer permitted flushing activities. The UDF Plan will resume when weather conditions permit in the spring of 2024 and will be implemented annually.

**Creek Road Water Main** - Approximately 600 feet of the Creek Road Water main is inactive. The Town contracted with Tata & Howard, Inc. to complete design and provide construction services for replacement of the inactive portion of water main. The project will eliminate two dead ends in the

distribution system, improve water quality and transmission capabilities, provide flow capacity and improve fire flow to extremities of Town, improve overall hydraulic deficiencies in the water distribution system, and provide water service to the upcoming Creek Road Pump Station Resiliency Improvement project. Construction is anticipated to start during the summer of 2024.

**Lead Service Line (LSL) Inventory** - Under Section 141.84 of the Lead and Copper Rule Revisions, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will require Public Water Systems (PWSs) to develop and submit a (LSL) Inventory by October 2024. The Town contracted with Tata & Howard, Inc. to complete the LSL Inventory, which includes review of existing records, creation of a database of available information, determine a list of unknown water service materials, conduct home inspections to confirm unknown water service materials, and submit the inventory to regulatory agencies by October 2024 to identify next steps. The Town was awarded grant monies from the DWSRF Program to complete the LSL Inventory.

### **SEWER DIVISION**

**Operations** – The Sewer Division staff maintains the collection system in accordance with our Collection System Operation and Maintenance Plan, a key component of the Capacity, Management, Operation, and Maintenance (CMOM) requirements in our National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit which also guides Wastewater Pollution Control Facility (WPCF) operations.

In 2023, discussion continued with EPA and MassDEP regarding Marion WPCF’s discharge permit. In March, EPA notified Marion WPCF that they were no longer seeking to include Marion WPCF under their NPDES Small Wastewater Treatment Facility General Permit, allowing all parties to focus on Marion WPCF’s Individual NPDES Permit renewal and the flow increase requested in that application.

**Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan** – In June, the Town’s Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan (CWMP) was finalized. We would like to thank the Select Board, Town staff, Weston & Sampson, the Citizens Advisory Committee, and all those who provided feedback and attended and participated in public meetings during the multi-year process to create the plan. The Final CWMP is available on the Town website.

**Creek Road Pumping Station** – Throughout 2023, Town staff worked with FEMA, MEMA, Weston & Sampson and Tata & Howard to follow-up on the application submitted to FEMA’s Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) in late 2022 to fund the replacement of the aging, vulnerable, and unsafe existing Creek Road Pumping Station. This grant request is based on bid-ready plans and specifications for a new resilient station which was funded by a FY21 Coastal Zone Management (CZM) Coastal Resilience Grant. The Town provided multiple submittals with additional information and answered questions that arose as part of FEMA’s review of the application. Also, as part of that review, a site visit was conducted in August. FEMA continues to review the application, with no firm timetable for a decision.

**Point Road Pumping Station Force Main** – In 2023, the cast iron force main leaving the Point Road Pumping Station, which is over 50 years old, experienced two separate failures in the same general area just outside the station. During the first break in February, Sewer Division personnel and pumping contractors worked to pump out the station and continue to provide sewer service to the area until a repair crew from Robert B. Our could complete the emergency repair. In the spring, Aqua Line Utility worked with Sewer Division employees and pumping contractors in response to another break in the immediate area of the previous repair. After an initial attempt to perform another emergency patch repair, it was determined that the best solution would be to replace the first portion of this force main (approximately 100 feet of pipe) with brand new pipe. Aqua Line mobilized additional crews to complete this installation of the new sewer main as soon as possible. A section of this force main pipe, that was removed during

the first repair, was sent for analysis which determined that the failure was due to a brittle fracture from a bending load, likely tied to stresses from the backfill material and road traffic above the location of the break in combination with the age and material of the force main.

**Wastewater Treatment Plant and Lagoon Improvements Project** – In 2023, with the project at substantial completion and the newly lined lagoon in operation, the focus was on punch list and warranty items, including correcting issues with the lagoon’s aeration systems. With minimal items left to complete, the expectation is that the project will reach final completion in Spring 2024.

**Inflow & Infiltration (I/I) Program** – In 2023, approximately 40,000 linear feet of gravity sewer main and 150 manholes were inspected. This work helped to identify new I/I sources in the sewer collection system which will be prioritized for upcoming I/I removal projects.

I would like to thank the Department of Public Works employees for their hard work and support in 2023. I am proud to be part of such a hardworking team.

**BUILDING DEPARTMENT**

To the Honorable Select Board,

I am pleased to provide this report on the activities of the Marion Building Department for the year 2023.

Marion's Building Department is responsible for administering the General Laws of Massachusetts' Building, Electrical, Plumbing and Gas codes, Architectural Access Board regulations, and Town of Marion Zoning Ordinances as they relate to land use, construction, occupancy and demolition of buildings and structures.

The Department's primary goal is to protect the public's life, health, safety, and welfare as it relates to construction and occupancy of buildings. We ensure that all construction, reconstruction, alterations, and repairs conform to the requirements of the State Building, Electrical, Plumbing and Gas Codes and the Town of Marion Zoning Ordinance, and by conducting annual inspections on specified use groups in existing buildings.

This year has been another vibrant building year in the Town of Marion. Although the growth of construction projects has leveled off, the volume and variation of building is still very strong. Our department is currently working on several notable projects. The old Lockheed Martin property has been sold, and the new owners are renovating several of the buildings for new tenants. There is also vacant land in the rear of the property that may be developed. Construction has begun on the new Harbormaster building and upon completion will give a much-needed enhancement to Marion's beautiful waterfront. The proposed new Department of Public Works facility design is complete and will be going out to bid shortly. With the Town House exterior complete, interior renovations continue with required code upgrades being the next area of focus.

Our Building Department staff is unchanged this year and in my opinion the level of service from our office staff and our inspectors is second to none. It gives us great pride being able to serve such a unique community with its vast array of architectural charm and quality craftsmanship.

## **Report of the FACILITIES DIRECTOR**

To the Honorable Select Board:

I am pleased to submit my eleventh report of the Marion Facilities Department for 2023.

I would like to welcome Michael Duval, Carpenter, to the Marion Facilities Department. Michael was hired in February of 2023 and has over 30 years of residential construction experience.

In addition to our daily responsibilities, the Facilities Department has completed the following projects:

### **Marion Town House**

- Installation of a new 80KW full-service generator.
- Relocate Facilities Department operations from 13 Atlantis Drive into the newly renovated 4,500 square foot Town House Annex basement.
- Renovate and restore the Clerk's Office and vault.
- Basement waterproofing in the front 1876 section of the Marion Town House. This included new LED lighting, re-pointing of the exterior granite walls, over 60 lineal feet of trenching and drainage pipe, installation of two sump pumps, vapor barrier, and new 4" thick reinforced concrete floor.
- Reinforced deteriorated brick columns with steel lally columns and new concrete footings.
- Restore the original stairwell that led to the Annex basement. With a few building code upgrades, we were able to open up this area to the original Tabor School footprint. The original stairwell from Tabor was used to access the basement gym and locker room, as well as a workshop for boat building and repair.
- Paint interior hallways.

### **Parks**

- Demolish and rebuild Bicentennial Park gazebo.
- New Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) walkway and benches at Silvershell Beach. These walkways provide access for everyone, from the parking lot to the beach house facilities and park.

### **Elizabeth Taber Library**

- Raise and restore foyer staircase handrails. The original handrails were dangerously low and unstable - 32" tall, which do not meet today's building code. We removed the entire handrail system, extended each baluster and newel post another 9", and restored them to their natural finish.
- Remove foyer staircase carpet and restore the original wood flooring.

### **Benjamin D. Cushing Community Center**

- Install new kitchen ventilation hood and fire suppression system.
- Replace 1960's single pane windows with new insulated fixed windows throughout the main hall.
- With help from the Energy Management Committee, the Town received a \$194,000.00 grant from Green Communities for weatherization and HVAC upgrades to Fire Station #1, #2, and Community Center. These upgrades are estimated to save the town \$9,500.00 in fossil fuel expenses. The grant funded the installation of two new electric heat pump systems in the main hall area of the Community Center with an estimated annual fuel savings of \$2,895.00.
- Excavate and pour foundation for new addition that will start in March of 2024.

### **Marion Music Hall**

- Sippican Historical Society generously funded the HVAC replacement at the Music Hall. This new high efficiency electric heat pump provides heating and cooling in the main hall, cutting the use of natural gas in half.

### **Fire Station #1 and #2**

- We replaced siding and trim on the south side of Fire Station #1.
- Repair exterior trim/siding and paint Fire Station #2.
- Fire Station #1 and #2 both received funding from the Green Communities grant to install new heat pump systems and weatherization upgrades.
- Fire Station #1 received three heat pumps with six zones. This new system replaces the in-wall mounted air conditioning units with new units that provide heating and cooling. The estimated fuel savings is \$5,030.00 annually.
- Fire Station #2 received one heat pump and two zones of heating and cooling. The estimated fuel savings is \$1,630.00 annually.

I'd like to thank my Foreman – Dennis Bellefeuille, Carpenter – Micheal Duval, Marion's Energy Management Committee, Sippican Historical Society, and the Department of Public Works for all your help and support throughout the year.

## **Report of BOARD OF HEALTH**

While Covid-19 has not disappeared, it has evolved from a pandemic to a more endemic illness similar to influenza, and your Board of Health has spent less time on Covid and more on its traditional duties.

Food inspections are done routinely for all restaurants and other establishments serving food to the public at least twice a year and more often when violations are found. Inspections are also done for special events, and longer visits are done prior to the opening of any new restaurant.

Beach monitoring is done during the summer months, with five public and five semi-public beaches having weekly water samples drawn locally and tested for bacterial contamination by state laboratories.

The Board sponsored drive-through clinics for both influenza vaccine and Covid boosters, working closely with the Fire and Police Departments. Vaccination clinics are also offered at Littleneck Village, and our town nurse gives vaccines at home visits.

The nurse also has weekly office hours at the Benjamin D. Cushing Community Center and holds regular blood pressure clinics at Marconi Village and Littleneck Village. Working with the Fire Department's Community/EMS (Emergency Medical Services) program, she makes home visits for health monitoring and safety evaluation at the request of the residents and/or their physicians.

Reviewing septic system plans and monitoring the progress of expanded nitrogen-reducing systems takes time by the Board and all of the staff. We are carefully monitoring the State's expanding mandates and preparing to respond as necessary.

This past summer/fall we reviewed and updated our tobacco control regulations to comply with the State's requirements. We work with a state-funded tobacco control officer to ensure that underaged residents cannot purchase tobacco products.

We also reviewed and left unchanged our requirements for safety fencing around home swimming pools.

We dealt with several complaints about substandard housing and worked with the owners to resolve these vexing issues in a manner that protected public safety without being overly burdensome.

We tried to educate town residents about such important health issues as extreme heat and mosquito-borne illness via town wide e-mails.

During the past year, we joined with five other area towns to form a regional consortium that will receive state grants and use this money to add additional services as each town requests. Marion will beef up its inspections at no added cost to the Town.

In closing, I want to recognize our superb staff: Lori Desmarais, the Town Nurse and Public Health Director, Shallyn Rodriguez, Health Agent, and Maureen Murphy, Administrative Assistant. They are the glue that holds us all together.

## Report of PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTOR

To the Honorable Select Board:

In 2023, I entered my third year as the Public Health Director and Nurse. I have enjoyed working together with the residents of the town, town employees and businesses.

Public Health Nursing Services support the health and well-being of the population of the Town of Marion. This is done both by addressing the immediate health needs and by anticipating future needs. These services are offered in a variety of ways through individually scheduled appointments, clinics, home visits and community events.

Weekly Public Health Nurse clinics continued at the Benjamin D. Cushing Community Center offering Blood Pressure and Blood Glucose screening, B12 injections (as prescribed) and support of the Memory Café. We offered Monthly Sharps Drop-Off at the Community Center and provided free Sharps Containers for resident use.

Shallyn Rodriguez, our new health agent joined the Marion Health Department in December of 2022. She has been a great addition to our department and has fit right in. As the Health Agent, she conducts food and body art inspections, investigates housing and other complaints, assists with camp inspections, and is becoming more familiar with septic systems and inspections. We would like to thank the three Consultants, Robert Ethier, David Flaherty, and Dale Barrows for all their kindness, assistance, and patience with our many questions. They have been gracious with sharing their many years of experience and knowledge.

A new Food Establishment Initial Plan Review Application was adopted which helped to be sure everything was in place as we welcomed five new food establishments to Marion.

Marion is part of a regional Massachusetts Tobacco Cessation and Prevention program which is paid for through grant funding. Megan daCosta has been appointed as the Tobacco and Marijuana Public Health Program Manager. The Marion Board of Health voted to enact a regulation entitled "Restricting the Sale of Tobacco & Nicotine Delivery Products". The regulation incorporates MA 105 CMR 665: Minimum Standards for Retail Sale of Tobacco and Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems language, fining structure, identification requirements, etc. as well as local decisions such as imposing a descending permit cap and increasing the minimum pricing for cigars.

On May 11, 2023, we saw the end of the Covid-19 Public Health Emergency. We continued to support the Town and residents by offering Covid vaccines and by making available free home antigen tests at the Board of Health, Benjamin D. Cushing Community Center, and Elizabeth Taber Library.

We continued our partnership with the Marion Fire Department and Marion Council on Aging, providing outreach and community educational risk reduction programs to the residents of Marion through the Marion Cares Community/EMS Program. I provided educational presentations at the Community Center with Lyle McKay, EMS Director, and Paramedic, such as Fall Prevention, Stroke Awareness, Heat-Related Illnesses, Disaster Preparedness and Fire Prevention. During 2023, we logged in 111 home visits and expanded our Blood Pressure and Vaccine clinics to Marconi Village and Marion Village Estates.

With the help of medically trained staff (nurses, physicians, EMTs, Paramedics, and UMass Nursing Students) and volunteers, we were able to continue with our drive-thru vaccination clinics. In 2023, we were able to administer 121 Covid vaccines along with 548 Seasonal Influenza vaccines. Multiple clinics and locations were offered including Community Center drive-thru, Little Neck Village, Marconi Village, Marion Village Estates, Nurse Clinics at the Community Center, Marion Town House, Sippican Elementary School, Tabor Academy and home visits.

Plymouth County Mosquito Control conducted aerial larvicide spraying of selected swamps. They offered residential spraying and residents could call up to eight times per season. In September, we were notified of 2 WNV positive mosquito samples in Marion. Plymouth County Mosquito Control inspected standing water areas in Marion and treated them with larvicide as needed.

Cape Cod & Southeast Massachusetts Rabies Task Force conducted Oral Rabies Vaccine (ORV) Distribution via helicopter and bait stations to reduce rabies in wildlife in the Spring and Fall. It's important to report when you see wildlife/animals with strange behavior, keep your distance from wild animals, vaccinate your pets, and keep wild animals like bats and racoons out of your home by capping your chimneys and repair holes in attics and cellars.

With the help of Marion's Senior Work Off Program, we were able to once again hire John Powers and Frank Murphy to assist the Board of Health with our weekly summer beach testing of our public and semipublic beaches. 126 tests were performed over a 15 week period. While other beaches in our area had to close due to high bacteria levels, we were happy to report we did not have any beach closures this season. The Board of Health had received reports regarding an algae bloom in Sippican Harbor. Luckily the algae at the waterfront was not harmful cyanobacteria (also known as blue-algae) or red tide, but instead a non-harmful form of algae.

All of this would not have been possible without the wonderful support of our Administrative Assistant, Maureen Murphy. She is always with a smile and willing to lend a hand.

At the Marion Council on Aging, the work we do is guided by our values, mission, and vision statements.

### Values

“Marion’s Council on Aging seeks to foster a community for all persons, regardless of race, color, sex, religion, politics, physical or mental ability, sexual orientation or income. We provide information, activities, services, education and a place to gather in a supportive and safe environment.”

### Mission

“The Council on Aging advocates on behalf of Marion’s Older Adult population. We seek and support educational, recreational, fitness and cultural programs and other activities. We encourage social interaction within our community. We strive to provide our constituency an enhanced quality of life.”

### Vision

“We will remain committed to providing sustained leadership in supporting Marion’s Older Adult population. We will foster and expand community-based, age-friendly services in a safe and empowering environment, assisting those residents to live independently and in good health. **Report of  
MARION AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST**

To the Honorable Select Board:

The mission of the Marion Affordable Housing Trust is the creation and preservation of housing in Marion for the benefit of low- and moderate-income households. In achieving our mission, we seek:

To promote a variety of affordable housing options for those with modest income, including young adults, families, long-time residents, the elderly, downsizers, returning Marion residents and municipal employees.

To preserve the natural, historic and seaside character of our Town and to nurture our sense of a diverse, yet integrated community.

Activities for the Trust in 2023 included:

1. The Trust continues to actively search for potential properties suitable for affordable housing development for families, municipal housing, seniors, and veterans.
2. The Trust examined their website and began to list information that needed to be added. Website development is an ongoing project as members have examined not only the Affordable Housing Trust Committee in Marion but in other communities.
3. Chair Terri Santos sent facts regarding Salem Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) to each member in January. Since January, on a monthly basis, members have discussed research as well as current trends in Accessory Dwelling Units. Examples were presented to the group from a forum on affordable housing by Congressman William R. Keating.
4. Community Preservation proposals and funds have been discussed each month. One proposal in the spring was to purchase rain barrels with diverters. A contact was made to the Great American Rain Barrel Company to help families who need assistance with water bills. This will be revisited in 2024. Other suggestions for the use of the Community Preservation funds ranged from handicap ramps, railing for the elderly and assistance with energy efficient windows.
5. The Trust applied for grants to include the Massachusetts Housing Partnership Assistance. While Marion was not one of the communities awarded, it was important to complete the application process.
6. The Trust continues to cooperate with the Planning Board on matters of Zoning and for possible amendments to the Zoning Bylaws that will encourage affordable housing in appropriate areas of the Town. The Marion Affordable Housing Trust examined the Marion Inclusionary bylaw. In addition, the committee discussed 230-8.6 Accessory Apartments as well as the growth of short-term rentals and its impact on the housing market for long term renters.

We wish to express our appreciation to Town Administrator Geoffrey Gorman.

TRI-TOWN VETERANS SERVICES OFFICE**

To the Honorable Select Board:

The Tri-Town Veterans Services Office serves the Towns of Marion, Mattapoisett and Rochester. We are located at the Mattapoisett Town Hall at 16 Main Street, Mattapoisett, MA. The Office is open Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 8 A.M. to 4 P.M. The telephone number is (508) 758-4100, Ext. 212/214. The Veterans Services Office assists Veterans and their families as defined by Massachusetts General Laws. Chapter 115 is a state-funded, needs-based program available to Veterans and Widows/Widowers who meet Executive Office of Veterans Services (EVOS) income guidelines. We also assist Veterans and their families with seeking benefits through the Department of Veterans Affairs. Our office continues to serve Veterans and their families on an individual basis to see that they receive the assistance they need when they need it. We continue to partner with local, state, and national organizations to ensure that all their needs are met to the best of our abilities.

In 2023, the effects of inflation continue to take a toll on our Veterans, many of whom are seniors and live on modest fixed incomes. We increased our partnerships with area food pantries to help counteract the high cost of groceries. The price and availability of housing in our area are also major concerns to our Veterans. Our office submitted three times the number of VA claims compared to 2022. The number of Veterans receiving VA benefits also increased, resulting in thousands more dollars being paid out and put into our local economy. This past year our office saw a steady uptick in both walk-ins and appointments with most Veterans citing other Veterans as referrals. So please, if you are a Veteran, a Veteran's widow, or widower, or know a Veteran who may need financial or medical assistance please reach out to our office.

## **Report of POLICE DEPARTMENT**

To the Honorable Select Board:

I am pleased to offer this report on some of the activities of the Marion Police Department for 2023.

There were some personnel changes in the department during the year. Officer Stephen Dawson accepted a job with the Somerset Police Department and Officer Taylor Souza accepted a job with the New Bedford Police Department. We wish both Officers the best of luck and thank them for their service with our department. After 23 dedicated years of service to the Marion Police Department, Officer Robert Krystofolski announced his retirement. We thank Officer Krystofolski for his commitment to the department and wish him well in retirement.

We continue to navigate “An Act Relative to Justice, Equity and Accountability in Law Enforcement in the Commonwealth.” This 129-page document establishes a Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST) Commission to certify police officers statewide, tasks the Massachusetts Police Training Committee with additional training for officers (specifically part-time police officers) and requires departments to have specific language in their policy and procedures, in addition to a multitude of other requirements.

The Massachusetts Police Accreditation Commission issued the new 6<sup>th</sup> edition standards, and we are preparing for our on-site assessment in February 2024.

Our Officers continue to be engaged in the community, hosting our annual toy drive for families in need and our senior holiday dinner. Additionally, in November Tri-Town police officers played a fundraising basketball game against the ORR Unified Team. Everyone laughed, had fun, and raised money for a great cause. Our officers are constantly striving to be a positive presence in the community.

The department remains actively involved with Plymouth County Outreach. Plymouth County Outreach was formed in December 2016 and is comprised of all the police departments in Plymouth County. When an individual experiences an overdose, responding officers are equipped with Narcan to reverse the overdose if necessary. Within 24-48 hours after the overdose, a plain clothes officer and an outreach counselor will attempt to visit the individual who overdosed. The purpose of the visit is to offer information and access to treatment services. Additionally, at-risk individuals can be identified through self-disclosure, referred by a family member, or loved one, or anyone else. If you or a loved one is looking for assistance from Plymouth County Outreach and could benefit from their resources, please contact our department and speak with myself or Lt. Jeffrey Habicht.

In September, we began a joint initiative between our department and the Sippican School which provides a School Resource Officer (SRO) at the Sippican School. The SRO plays a role in maintaining a safe and secure environment while building positive relationships with students, staff, and parents. Officer Jonathan Tracy was selected to fill the role of SRO.

In November, we held a women’s self-defense class and raised \$900.00 that we donated to the New Bedford Women’s Center. We hope to hold this class every fall in honor of Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Our class was filled to capacity and participants learned valuable and empowering skills to protect themselves.

I would like to thank the other town departments for all their assistance and support throughout the past year. I wish to offer my gratitude to all the members, sworn and civilian, of the Marion Police Department. Our department continues to face any challenge with integrity and professionalism. I would like to thank all of them for their dedication to keeping Marion a safe place to live.

**Report of  
ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER**

To the Honorable Select Board:

Animal Control responded to 267 calls for service in 2023. These calls included quarantines for animal bites, violation of animal by-laws and/or neglect complaints.

MA CMR 140, section 145B requires that owners of cats, dogs and ferrets vaccinate their pets against rabies. Massachusetts law also requires that all dogs be licensed.

Animal Control would like to remind pet owners that should an altercation occur between one's pet and a person or another animal, it is important to gather as much information as possible (from all parties involved). This may eliminate the need for an animal bite victim to undergo rabies treatment.

Another important function of Animal Control is to monitor the occurrence of animal diseases in Massachusetts. Disseminating information on detection and how to prevent infection is essential in the control of these diseases. The Massachusetts Department of Agriculture (MDAR) has information on biosecurity measures that can be taken when dealing with these diseases. Should citizens have questions or concerns, they may contact the MDAR or Animal Control for further information.

The rabies baiting program will continue this year by the USDA, Cape Cod and Southern MA Rabies Task Force. By orally administering the vaccine to raccoons, the goal is to prevent the spread of the virus to the Cape Cod area.

Thank you to all that contributed to the PAUS fund and also to the Southcoast Humane Society and Shelter for all they do caring for our lost and stray animals.

## Report of EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

To the Honorable Select Board:

I am pleased to offer this report on some of the activities of the Marion Emergency Management Agency for 2023.

This year we had one FEMA disaster declaration for Hurricane Lee. Federal disaster assistance was made available to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to supplement local recovery efforts in the areas affected by the storm September 15-17, 2023.

In 2021, we launched our Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), which we are extremely proud of, and we continued our team's training this past year. CERT is a nationwide volunteer program that educates individuals about disaster preparedness, specifically regarding hazards that may impact their area, and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization and disaster medical operations. CERT volunteers can assist others in their community following a disaster when professional responders are not immediately available to help. These volunteers are trained to assist and augment the Marion Police and Fire Departments for the following events: emergencies (severe weather); the opening of a shelter or warming site; pandemic and other public health-related emergencies; and town events like Town Meeting, town elections, parades and fireworks.

CERT is an excellent opportunity for anyone interested in serving their community. Members of the team will gain valuable skills and knowledge in areas of emergency planning and disaster response that will allow them to help their neighbors in times of need.

I respectfully submit the 2023 Annual Report for Marion Fire/EMS.

As happens almost every year, we have once again experienced a change in personnel. We recognize that the members of Marion Fire/EMS are our most valuable asset and many move on to have successful careers in larger fire departments in Massachusetts and beyond. Recruitment and Retention is a high priority for the department as this is crucial to maintaining a high level of professionalism that is relied upon by the community we serve. The following members have resigned from the department over the last 12-month period. Paramedic Scott Labelle (7 yrs.), Recruit Firefighter Sergio Gonzalez (2 yrs.), Recruit Firefighter Brandon Davies (1 yr). New members include Paramedic Brandon Moreno and Paramedic Chester Moroz. The following members achieved certification in these areas: Recruit Firefighter Dalton Lyons - Firefighter I/II, Recruit Firefighter Jacob Ouellette - Firefighter I/II, Recruit Firefighter Christopher Peckham - Firefighter I/II.

This past year we continued to see success with our Community EMS program "Marion Cares". We conducted 114 home visits during 2023. The mission of the program continues to focus on keeping residents in their home where they feel most comfortable for as long as possible. The program continues to take shape evolving around the needs of the community. As we continue to provide community outreach and community educational risk reduction programs, we have seen positive effects of the program firsthand. Through this program we have captured an acute hypertensive crisis that resulted in the activation of the stroke team at Tobey Hospital for rapid treatment. Also, during a home wellness visit we discovered a patient with rales that resulted in transport to the hospital and the removal of over a liter of fluid from the lungs. Our EMS Coordinator works closely with the Town Nurse, Council on Aging, Marion Police Department, Bristol Elder Services and Coastline Elderly Services to promote health and safety in everyday life. We are finding that this program is critical to keeping Marion residents safe in their home improving quality of life. We continuously monitor the results of the program and seek new innovative ideas for further expansion. Fire department members are extremely proud to be part of this program. They find it very rewarding to have a role in being proactive in preventing injury and illness.

We continue to pursue as many grant opportunities as possible to expand our programs and minimize the costs to taxpayers. We closed out a four-year grant program that offset the costs of recruiting and outfitting paid-on-call firefighters. Our Recruitment and Retention program resulted in twenty paid-on-call firefighters added to the department over the four-year period. The cost associated with this program over the four-year period was \$105,947.88. The cost was covered by FEMA through the Assistance to Firefighter Grant (AFG) Program. We were also very successful with the AFG grant this year. We have been awarded \$190,476 for the replacement of our Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). All 25 units will be replaced with up-to-date fully compliant units. The cost match for the Town of Marion will be 5% of the purchase price not to exceed \$14,284.77. We also received an AFG award to replace the brush truck that was purchased by the department in 1964. The current truck has failed and is unsafe therefore will not be

re-built. We will receive \$285,695.23 to assist with the cost of a new brush truck. We are currently preparing the specifications and will hopefully award the contract before the spring of 2024.

At the Annual Town Meeting in May 2023, we put forward an article requesting the purchase of the Town’s first new ladder truck. The ladder truck is being built by Emergency One Fire Apparatus in Ocala, Florida. The purchase was made through a purchasing agent that is recognized by the State of Massachusetts for Government-to-Government procurement. We are grateful for the support for this article, which was overwhelmingly positive. We look forward to delivery later in 2024.

**Call Activity:** We responded to a total of 1,466 emergency calls in 2023. The busiest day of the week is Monday. The busiest time of day is between 10 am and 11 am. We provided Mutual Aid to other communities 175 times and received Mutual Aid 37 times. The number of medical calls has increased to 1,009. Medical responses by reasons include falls, motor vehicle crashes and difficulty breathing as the most common occurrence. One third of the patients treated and transported were classified as basic life support (BLS) incidents and two thirds were classified as advanced life support (ALS). Ambulance revenue generated in 2023 was just over \$480,000 dollars. The total estimated dollar loss due to fire is \$490,500. Eighteen percent of our calls occurred when manpower and equipment were busy with other emergencies.

## **Report of the RECREATION DEPARTMENT**

To the Honorable Select Board:

It is with great pleasure that I present the 2023 Annual Report of the Recreation Department. As a department, we enjoyed another successful year of programing for the Town of Marion and surrounding communities.

In the winter of 2023, we successfully ran our Learn to Play Basketball program that had over 65 participants in grades preschool through grade 2. Participants in this program learn the foundational concepts of basketball and teamwork. This is a favorite program for many of the younger children in town and the feedback is always positive. In addition to Learn to Play basketball, the Recreation Department in coordination with Mattapoisett Recreation, ran the Tri-town Basketball League. This league is comprised of over 150 boys and girls who compete in practices and games from the months of December to early March. The league continues to be a popular choice amongst children in grades 3 through 6.

As a continuation of the popular soccer programming, we offered an indoor futsal soccer program at Sippican School on Saturday mornings from December through early February. We had over 50 children in grades kindergarten through grade 5 participate in this program. This program is run by a local professional soccer coach in which kids continue to build upon foundational soccer skills.

During the spring of 2023, our Recreation Department organized and ran two competitive spring soccer teams. Our teams enjoyed success from March to the end of June. We are in the process of adding two additional competitive spring teams for the spring of 2024.

In the summertime, we experienced a full summer program. The Silvershell Summer Program ran for seven weeks and was near capacity with around 60 participants per week. These children were able to experience the camaraderie and fun that summer brings. They attended weekly field trips and even made time for special visits to the Fire Station and Harbormaster's Office. Our summer offerings also included tennis instruction on the courts behind Sippican School. We offered six weeks of small group tennis instruction to a diverse population of new and old tennis players. In addition to tennis, we were able to coordinate efforts with a professional golf instructor at the Reservation Club in Mattapoisett. This program ran for two weeks and featured over 30 different children having an opportunity to be exposed to golf, some for the first time! We hope to continue to expand our program offerings both in size and opportunity. We currently have theatre camp in the works for as a new offering for summer 2024.

Silvershell Beach had another busy season. The Recreation Department successfully trained and hired 12 new lifeguards and beach staff to our seasonal department. A special thanks to the lifeguards and the beach staff for continuing excellence and keeping the beach both clean and safe.

In the fall, we once again ran our full Recreation Soccer program. This program ran for eight weeks and sessions were held at the Dexter Field Complex in Rochester. We had over 150 participants in this program from kindergarten to grade 5.

In closing, I would like to thank the many town departments and dedicated employees that provided assistance and guidance during this challenging past year. Without the help of the entire community, many of these programs would not be possible.

## Report of HARBORMASTER

To the Honorable Select Board:

2023 was a transitional year for the Harbormaster Department. Harbormaster Isaac Perry accepted a position as the Mattapoisett Harbormaster. I want to thank past Harbormaster Isaac Perry for his 19 years of dedicated service to the Town of Marion. Harbormaster Perry's knowledge will be greatly missed; however, I wish him the best of luck in his new position. I was honored to be selected as Harbormaster. I thank Police Chief Richard Nighelli, Town Administrator Geoff Gorman, and Select Board for selecting and entrusting me for this important position.

Police reform of 2020 has changed the requirements of Marine Resource Officers. Town leaders decided to transition the department under the direction of the Chief of Police. Harbormaster officers were added to the organizational structure of the Marion Police Department.

This season, we implemented a fee increase to offset the shortfall in revenue needed to manage and operate Sippican Harbor successfully. The infrastructure suffered severe damage after several storms battered Sippican Harbor. We have devised a plan to repair and replace damaged docks and piers.

We were awarded an additional \$300,000 in grant funding from the Seaport Economic Council (SEC), bringing a total of \$1.9 million dollars to the Town of Marion for the new Maritime Center. We are very grateful for the support of the SEC and we look forward to beginning construction of the new Maritime Center in 2024.

We continue to research and apply for grants for funding of future projects, including the seawall in need of repair at Island Wharf and public access, including replacing the aging docks.

We are currently in the development stage of a new and improved database for managing our harbor permits. This database will streamline the payment system and allow us to get important messages out to the boating community in a timely manner.

Thank you to the Harbormaster staff for their support and dedication to our mission, making this a seamless transition.

Thank you to the Marine Resource Commission for their support and guidance. Thank you to all the Town Departments that provided valuable assistance throughout the year; this help is greatly appreciated.

We will continue working towards improving the waterways and providing high-quality service to the boating community.

2023 we continued with Tabor Academy operating our upweller system growing out 150,000 Oyster seed. Working alongside Tabor, the program ran well. The shellfish have been wintered over to maximize the growth allowing for a better survival rate when they are put on the shoreline for residence to harvest.

We have seen an increase in recreational shellfishing by kayaking, boating, and utilizing shoreline access. Families have found ways to reach the areas that are plentiful. We had a great season and didn't have to close any of the shellfishing areas due to excessive rainfall or contamination.

The commercial shellfishing, as well as the aquiculture sites, have all done very well this year. We had no citations or violations for any commercial activities. All sites are currently in compliance with regulations.

I would like to thank the members of the Marine Resources Commission for their support and guidance as well as all the Town Departments that provide valuable assistance throughout the year, this support is greatly appreciated. ## Report of MARION ENERGY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

To the Honorable Select Board:

The Marion Energy Management Committee (EMC) continued its principal mission to develop and implement initiatives to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from, and energy consumption by, Marion's municipal, residential, commercial, industrial, and institutional sectors. EMC also identified the need for renewal of the Community Electricity Aggregate (CEA) Program and assisted the process.

As the urgency to address the climate crisis increases around the world, EMC strives to act responsively by leading the town away from its use of fossil fuels and encourages new construction to be Net Zero, i.e., on average producing as much energy as it uses.

Some meetings this past year have been virtual only while others have been in-person only.

**MEMBERSHIP:** Other than the press, there have been few visitors to EMC meetings. A regular attendee from the Town would be of great benefit to finding and applying for grants. Kim Holbrook joined EMC in October and Jennifer Francis was reinstated as a full member.

**ENERGY REDUCTION:** Proposals for installing new heat pumps at the Police Station are being considered and might qualify for Green Community grants. At a meeting with Energy Source management at the Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP), plans for replacement of the heating control system have been discussed. EMC considers that improved insulation of the Town House walls would be beneficial and should ideally be combined with other work.

**MASS ENERGY INSIGHT PROGRAM (MEI):** Member Friedman took over from Member Saltonstall the collection and processing of Marion energy usage data in MEI and the Green Communities annual report.

**MASSACHUSETTS GREEN COMMUNITIES PROGRAM:** July analysis revealed that the Town after six years had exceeded its Green Communities goal of reducing energy consumption by at least 20%. In large part, this was done thanks to the grants of the Green Communities program. EMC includes Town-financed energy efficiency measures in the Green Communities Annual Report, which is otherwise complete. The October deadline to apply for new grants was missed due to the late arrival of a completion letter. New proposals can be submitted in the spring, such as replacement of the mechanical controllers at the WWTP and transformers for Sippican School.

**ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS:** The three plug-in hybrid police cruisers need charging stations at the Police Station. Potential locations for new charging stations could include Washburn Park, Silvershell Beach, fire stations, Indian Cove and Marconi Village. Many existing Town charging stations need maintenance or additional charging cables to bring them back to fully useable condition. It is not known who would implement installation.

- A MassEVIP Public Access Charging (PAC) program will pay up to 80% of EV charging stations and installation costs with a maximum of \$50,000 per street address; because the Town cannot charge for charging if using Green Communities grants for the stations, federal grants may be preferred.
- The Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) Program has a blueprint for Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure for the Community (Blueprint 4B).

**MUNICIPAL VEHICLES:** Green Communities are now tracking Municipal vehicles by VIN and are looking carefully at new vehicle purchases.

**NEW CONSTRUCTION:** EMC is concerned that both the new Department of Public Works (DPW) Building and the Harbormaster Building have not included photovoltaics as an integral part of the initial construction, despite the roofs being designed with adequate strength to carry them and that they will be solar ready. EMC reviewed the 2023 Stretch Code changes and decided to postpone their adoption.

**PHOTOVOLTAICS ON TOWN PROPERTY:** Suggested revisions to Marion Bylaws to facilitate the use of photovoltaics in Marion were forwarded to the Bylaw Subcommittee. While the Federal incentive is still available, there is some urgency to install projects in the town. Solar projects that are below 15 kW do not require grid interconnection studies, simplifying the approval process. Of that size being considered are the Police Station roof and at the Benjamin D. Cushing Community Center, perhaps on the roof.

- Cape and Vineyard Electric Cooperative (CVEC) are still negotiating a Solar Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) with Eversource for the project on the Benson Brook capped landfill. Until the proposed lease payment to the Town is known and is sufficient, EMC recommends that the Town wait before considering construction.
- Large solar projects being considered include ground-mounted arrays at the WWTP and a solar canopy over the parking lot at the Community Center.
- The demand for electricity is expected to rise as new construction is completed and as Town House demand rises. Opportunities for fossil fuel usage to be replaced by electrical can further increase demand.

**PRESENTATIONS TO THE SELECT BOARD:** In a letter to the Honorable Select Board (HSB) dated September 27, 2023, EMC requested authorization to work with HSB to develop one or more of the potential solar generation projects at municipal sites at the WWTP site, Police Station rooftop, Community Center site, proposed DPW building and the Town's Capped Landfill. EMC also suggested that the town should not commit to buying all its electricity from Eversource since solar technology has given Marion a viable way to diversify its power supply.

**EMC PROPOSED PLANS:** A hybrid meeting approach to include virtual attendees is to be developed. EMC proposes to discourage the use of fossil fuels in all new construction. The Town's EMC website is to be updated.

## Report of CONSERVATION COMMISSION

To the Honorable Select Board:

The Marion Conservation Commission completed another active year, helping to protect Marion's significant coastal and freshwater wetland resources and open spaces. During 2023, the Commission issued:

- 26 Orders of Conditions
  - 1 Restoration Order of Conditions
  - 5 Amended Orders of Conditions
  - 5 Extensions to Existing Orders of Conditions
- 20 Certificates of Compliance
- 31 Determinations of Applicability
  - 1 Order of Resource Area Delineation
  - 1 Enforcement Order

The Conservation Commission held 23 meetings during 2023 at which applications were reviewed, public hearings held, deliberations made and decisions written and ratified. In preparation for our meetings, the Commission performed more than 120 site inspections.

Although the primary role of the Marion Conservation Commission is the administration of the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act and associated regulations, the Commission is also responsible for the care of nine town-owned properties and is the grantee of six Conservation Restrictions.

During 2023, the Conservation Commission was joined by a new associate member – Alex Hansell. Again, this year, members of the Commission attended training sessions held by the Massachusetts Association of Conservation Commissions (MACC) to expand their knowledge of State requirements, emerging environmental issues, and administrative processes.

During the year, the Commission was ably assisted by Terri Santos, Administrative Assistant to the Commission and Doug Guey-Lee, Conservation Agent. The Commission thanks Terri and Doug for their excellent work.

## **Report of OPEN SPACE ACQUISITION COMMISSION**

To the Honorable Select Board:

The primary task of the Open Space Acquisition Commission is to acquire open space. These purchases must fit some stated need and respect the financial contribution that has been made by the taxpayers. Since the creation of the Open Space Acquisition Commission in 1999, we have partnered with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, United States Department of Agriculture, Sippican Lands Trust and The Trustees (formerly the Trustees of Reservations). Since we first started working with other groups, we have received more than \$1,000,000 in grants to help reduce the cost of open space purchases to the town. Today, of the 9,007 acres of land in Marion, 3,545 are permanently protected open space.

Marion ownership of permanently protected open space is quite diverse. Those groups managing/owning open space include Select Board, Charles Washburn Memorial Trust, Commonwealth of Massachusetts (Division of Fish and Game), Conservation Commission, Marine Resources Commission, Northeast Wilderness Trust, Open Space Acquisition Commission, Recreation, Sippican Lands Trust (SLT), The Trustees (formerly The Trustees of Reservations), Water & Sewer Commission, and Wildlands Trust.

The Open Space Acquisition Commission holds title to 631 acres. The largest parcel is the 282 acre Hales Brook/Sippican River Reservation, which is managed by The Trustees at no cost to the Town. The next largest, and perhaps busiest, parcel is the Washburn Park Conservation Land (97 acres), which is used heavily by the dog walking community. There were no additions to the open space inventory in 2023.

Work is ongoing on the Jenna Drive to Joanne Drive section of the Point Road Bike Path. The Marion Open Space Acquisition Commission was awarded a Community Preservation Act grant to construct a multi-use pathway along Point Road. The proposed  $\frac{3}{4}$  mile off-road pathway will provide safe year-round transportation and recreational opportunities for a variety of users and purposes as well as providing increased access to various under-utilized conservation areas.

MOSAC updated its 1995 Open Space Acquisition criteria. Like the 1995 criteria, the updated results were based on a survey of town board members whose Committees/Boards had a direct or tangential relationship with open space acquisition, SLT board members and a random selection of respondents to the 2016 Open Space and Recreation survey. The criterion that ranked the highest are given below with the "score" (on a scale of 1-5) and how the criterion ranked in the 1995 survey.

2023 Annual Report

The Mattapoisett River Valley Water District (District) was formed in 2004 to construct and operate the six million gallon per day (mgd) Mattapoisett River Valley Water Treatment Facility (MRVWTF). The District is comprised of the Towns of Fairhaven, Marion, Mattapoisett, and Rochester. The treatment facility, located in Mattapoisett, began operations in 2008.

The MRVWTF treats raw water from eight municipal water supply wells owned and operated by the District Towns. The sources include three Mattapoisett wells, one Marion well, and four Fairhaven wells, which are located in Mattapoisett and Rochester. Treatment at the facility includes oxidation with ozone followed by membrane ultrafiltration with Koch membrane filters for the removal of iron and manganese. The finished water is treated to adjust the pH for corrosion control.

The year 2023 represented the sixteenth year of operation of the MRVWTF. The plant processed 612 million gallons of water (finished water) during the 2023 calendar year. The FY24 operating budget for the plant is \$2,557,300, which represents an increase of approximately 5.1% over FY23. Major expenses include power, labor, and chemicals to maintain and operate the MRVWTF, equipment maintenance, and equipment replacement identified in the Capital Improvement Plan. The District continues to benefit from the solar power Net Metering agreement with Greenbacker Renewable Energy Corporation. The District is able to offset electrical costs through this program. The District does not pay any capital or operating costs for the power generation at the facilities, which are located on commercial buildings in Walpole, MA. In June 2023, the District solicited and received bids for FY24 supply of chemicals and propane at the MRVWTF.

The MRVWTF operated well, however, various equipment required maintenance or replacement during the calendar year. Operators replaced several actuator valves on the ultrafiltration stages throughout the year. Clean-in-place canisters were replaced. Other equipment requiring maintenance or replacement included pH and chlorine probes, a chlorine pump, and the rooftop heating unit. Standard maintenance and repairs were conducted on the generator and variable frequency drives. Wiring repairs were completed on the prefilters. Divers cleaned the clearwell and ozone contact tank. Large meter testing was conducted at the water treatment plant and at the water supply wells. Periodic maintenance to the air compressors at the water treatment plant was completed at various times during the year. The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) conducted a Sanitary Survey of the District facilities on April 27, 2023. There were no deficiencies found. This is typically conducted by the MassDEP once every three years.

In February 2023, Ms. Angeline Lopes Ellison, Fairhaven Town Administrator, was appointed by the Fairhaven Select Board as the third Fairhaven representative for the Committee following the retirement of Ms. Wendy Graves.

In February 2023, Mr. David Pierce was appointed as the third Marion representative for the Committee replacing Nathaniel Munafo.

In May 2023, the District applied for and received Emergency Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) for procurement of the ultrafiltration equipment associated with the water treatment plant upgrades project. The equipment procurement contract was released for public bid and subsequently awarded in August 2023.

The design and bidding phase for the water treatment plant upgrades project construction contract is ongoing and expected to be complete in the Spring of 2024 followed by construction beginning in the Fall of 2024. Construction is expected to be complete in the Spring of 2025.



On August 8, 2023, the water treatment plant building and surrounding property sustained damage due to a tornado including the perimeter fence, down trees, and damage to the rooftop heating unit air handler and generator automatic transfer switch.

On November 29, 2023, a virtual meeting was held with regional water officials to discuss current water operations, proposed water operations, and coordination of water operations between municipalities.

Quarterly meetings, including representatives from Fairhaven, Marion, and Mattapoisset, continued in 2023 to discuss raw water pumping totals from the various water supply sources and additional costs incurred by Fairhaven and Marion due to accepting more finished water from the MRVWTF than raw water pumped from its water supply sources that feed the MRVWTF. Discussions during these meetings also included possible ways to offset the additional costs incurred by Fairhaven and Marion.

## 2023 MRVWSPAC Annual Report

### History and Purpose of MRVWSPAC

The Mattapoissett River Valley Water Supply Protection Advisory Committee (MRVWSPAC) was established in 1980 by the Towns of Fairhaven, Mattapoissett, Marion, and Rochester. The organization grew out of a concern for the aquifer underlying the Mattapoissett River watershed, from which all four towns draw water supplies. Special legislation was enacted in 1983 (Chapter 407) formalizing the Committee.

The MRVWSPAC is made up of three (3) representatives from each Town for a total of 12 members. The MRVWSPAC holds public meetings on the second Tuesday of every month at 3:30 p.m. at the Fairhaven Board of Public Works Office in Fairhaven. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the MRVWSPAC has been meeting remotely using Zoom since April 2020 with the exception of the November 2022 meeting, which was held at Fairhaven Board of Public Works Office.

In February 2023, Ms. Angeline Lopes Ellison, Fairhaven Town Administrator, was appointed by the Fairhaven Select Board as the third Fairhaven representative for the Committee following the retirement of Ms. Wendy Graves.

In February 2023, Mr. David Pierce was appointed as the third Marion representative for the Committee replacing Nathaniel Munafa.

### Mattapoissett River Valley Aquifer

The Mattapoissett River and its aquifer provide fresh water for water supply, recreation, and agriculture to several communities in Bristol and Plymouth Counties in Massachusetts. In 2023, the aquifer supplied approximately 1.68 million gallons per day for Mattapoissett River Valley Water District residential and commercial water supply customers in the Towns of Mattapoissett, Fairhaven, Marion, and Rochester.

### Summary of 2023 MRVWSPAC Accomplishments

- Monitored stream flow and water levels at numerous locations in the vicinity of the Mattapoissett River. Maintained a database of critical water level data.
- Funded Annual Mattapoissett River Hydrologic Monitoring Report.
- Purchased the following new monitoring well electronic equipment to replace malfunctioning devices, which reached the end of their useful life.
  - Three (3) water level transducers (Leveloggers).

## Managing Water Resources for Our Future

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- Environmental review of projects in the Mattapoissett River Valley:
  - Reviewed plans for the following projects within the watershed and sent comment letters to the Rochester Planning Board:
    1. ANR Application – Map 38, Lot 16 Quaker Lane, Rochester.
    2. 250kW Solar Canopy – Rochester Memorial School
    3. ANR Application – 572 Snipatuit Road, Rochester.
    4. Solar Array Construction – 0 Cushman Road, Rochester.
  
- The Buzzards Bay Coalition (BBC) continued to work on funding the balance of the land purchase of approximately 240 acres of land owned by Dennis Mahoney & Sons, Inc. and Long Plain Land Co., LLC. following receipt of a Massachusetts Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness (MVP) Grant in August 2022. Additional funding included \$150,000 from the MRWSPAC, private fund raising, other grant applications, and Community Preservation Committee (CPC) funding with partnering Towns including Acushnet, Fairhaven, Marion, Mattapoissett, and Rochester. CPC funding was approved by all Towns in 2023 and all properties were formally acquired in July 2023. A ceremony dedicating the land acquisition occurred on November 20, 2023.
  
- In November 2023, Mr. David Wong from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) conducted a presentation for the Advisory Committee on invasive species in Snipatuit Pond and the Mattapoissett River Watershed. Mr. Wong discussed various invasive species that have been identified in the area, various means that can be implemented to mitigate species currently in place, preventative measures to minimize the spread of invasive species, and funding opportunities for invasive species control.

To the Honorable Select Board:

At the May 2023 Town Meeting the Community Preservation Committee (CPC) recommended ten Articles for Community Preservation Act funding:

1. \$25,000 to develop a report of Marion's local Historic District Study Group.
2. \$35,000 to update and expand the Marion historic and cultural resource Inventory.
3. \$26,928 to fund Enhanced School-Based Gardens and Garden Site at the Sippican School.
4. \$85,000 to fund the Mattapoissett River Valley Water Supply Resilience Project.
5. \$9,150 to preserve veteran's grave stones.
6. \$15,000 to complete the Osprey Marsh pavilion.
7. \$75,000 to construct pickleball courts at the Point Road playground.
8. \$35,000 to install smoke and fire alarms at the Marion Art Center.
9. \$17,500 to inventory the collections of the Marion Natural History Museum.
10. \$30,000 to preserve and digitize materials at the Sippican Historical Society.

Each article included a funding timeline, after which time, any unspent monies are to be returned to the Community Preservation Fund category from which said funding originated. All ten articles were approved by vote of the town meeting.

Also approved was an Article to provide \$2,000 of Fiscal Year 2024 funding to the Community Preservation Committee for administrative purposes.

The timeframe for funding for two previously approved projects were also extended (Marion Shared Use Path Easement Appraisals and the Garden Irrigation Project).

MARION CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLANNING COMMITTEE**

To the Honorable Select Board:

The Capital Improvements Planning Committee (CIPC) assists Town Departments in developing capital project requests as part of the annual budget process that is approved by residents at the Spring Town Meeting. Projects or assets that cost at least \$10,000 and have a useful life of at least 5 years are defined as capital projects. The CIPC typically visits various locations to further understand capital plans and needs. Unfortunately, the committee was unable to conduct any site visits in 2023. In 2023, the Select Board appointed two new CIPC members. Debra Watson and Mandy Givens filled positions previously held by Paul Naiman and Richard Giberti.

Each year, Marion Department Heads submit Capital Project requests to the CIPC that include the department's priority, budget impact, regulatory/public safety justification, equipment information (replacement, efficiency, useful life, cost reduction), alignment with the Master Plan and additional benefits to the Town. Committee members score each project based on the submission, and an average is calculated to create Capital Project rankings. The rankings provide an impartial perspective for the Finance Committee, Finance Director, Town Administrator and Select Board to aid them in the Budget Process. Ten (10)-Year Plans are also developed based on information submitted by the Department Heads, compiled by the Town Administrator, and reviewed by the Committee. This information provides a forecast of future Capital needs over the coming 10 years.

For Fiscal Year 2025 (FY 25), thirty-six projects, totaling \$9.482 million were submitted by the Department Heads. Eighteen of the projects were submitted by the Department of Public Works (DPW) totaling \$7.649 million. Eighteen additional projects were submitted by all the other Department Heads, totaling \$1.833 million.

Beginning this year, capital projects from the Old Rochester Regional (ORR) School District were not formally reviewed and ranked by the CIPC and are not included in this memo. ORR school officials briefed the CIPC on their plans and expectations for a new capital budgeting process that will address both small and large capital project needs and the funding sources for them. ORR officials also agreed to informally present and discuss their future capital projects and their 10-Year Capital Plan with the CIPC.

Below are the ranked projects for the DPW, and all other departments. Many of the DPW projects are regulatory and/or support public health and safety and are paid by way of fees, and thus receive higher rankings. The higher ranked projects for all other departments frequently have significant public health and safety value, or urgent need for equipment replacement.

The funding source for the DPW Highway's Community Center Parking Lot was identified as General Fund, but given the large cost of the project (\$1.787 million), the CIPC has listed that project in the above table as potentially requiring the town to take on additional debt. We recommend the Finance Committee clarify the potential funding source for this project.

Attachment to this memo is the most recent version of the 10-Year Plan (dated 1/25/24) for all departments. This Plan contains two additional Fiscal Year 2025 Projects (Upgraded Digital Radios for the Harbor Department and Town House Security Upgrades.) The attached Plan also reflects a \$100,000 grant received for the Town's Records Digitization Project. Because they were added after the committee had completed its process for Fiscal Year 2025, the two additional projects and the secured grant funds for the third were not considered, reviewed, or ranked by the CIPC, and are not reflected in the tables above.

To the Honorable Select Board:

The Marion Tree and Parks Committee continues with its work of planting and caring for street trees within the Town. To date we have planted close to 50 new trees in the last two years. Our tree planting efforts are concentrated mainly in the village area; Bicentennial Park, Evergreen Cemetery, the Children's Garden at Sippican School, the Benjamin D. Cushing Community Center's new park area, Spring Street and this spring we hope to plant several trees along Converse Road where Eversource removed so many last Spring. We have reached out to home owners to ask permission and many have responded yes.

Over our 25 years as a Tree City we have planted hundreds of trees as well as cared for our parks, especially Bicentennial Park. This past spring we helped to re-landscape the Children's Garden at Sippican School designed by Steve Gonsalves and Susannah Davis. It is a memorial garden for four children who died while attending Sippican School. It is a lovely peaceful area between the library and the school.

This coming spring we will be doing some replanting at Bicentennial Park including a new tree to mark the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Sippican Lands Trust. In addition, we will continue with our tree labeling project funded by the Marion Garden Discussion Group (MGG). We are tagging trees along the main roads in the village. The tags have been donated by MGG under Sylvia Strand's initiative. Take a look as you walk around town.

To the Honorable Select Board:

After 29 years of planning, land acquisition, surveying, and engineering, the Marion bike path is coming closer to becoming a reality. The path will follow the old New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railroad (NYNH&H) line from Mattapoissett to the BrewFish Bar and Eatery. After crossing Front Street, the path will follow the route once travelled by the New Bedford & Onset Street Railway Company electric trolley as far as Washburn Park. The path will meander through Washburn Park and reconnect with the old NYNH&H railroad route north to Point Road. A map of the route is available at on the Town's website [www.marionma.gov](http://www.marionma.gov), on the Pathways Committee page.

While construction of the path will be financed by MassDOT, the Town is responsible for securing the right-of way need for the path itself and for any temporary easements necessary for construction of the bike path. The Pathway Committee has been unable to act on the Community Preservation Act grant to conduct appraisals of the needed easements due to the delay in getting right of way plans approved by MassDOT.

MUSIC HALL ADVISORY COMMITTEE**

To the Honorable Select Board:

We are so pleased to share an update on the Music Hall. Many thanks to Ami Milano, our Coordinator. Ami continues to be quite busy keeping the Music Hall schedule, managing all events and supporting our policies for the good of the building.

Over 96 rentals and meetings were held in 2023, including social events such as birthday parties, life celebrations, a holiday party for Tabor Academy faculty, an event for Falmouth Academy, a Sippican Choral Society gathering, and an Eagle Scout pinning ceremony. Town events included a bird presentation from the Elizabeth Taber Library, the designated starting point for the annual Halloween parade, and the Marion Garden Group Holiday Sale followed by the Marion Village Christmas Stroll. We held rehearsals for the Town Concert Band during their summer season, and a concert by Marcus Monteiro. We hosted the Sippican Historical Society Speaker Series throughout the course of the year. Several weddings, baby showers, and rehearsal dinners also used the space. Numerous town committees and meetings were held here as well.

With the combined efforts of volunteers and neighbors, alongside the regular work of the town Department of Public Works - led by Jody Dickerson - the Music Hall is always looking its best. The Music Hall Monument Watering Team, a group of neighborhood women, continues to help plant, water, and tend the plants immediately surrounding the statue during the summer months. Each member is responsible for watering and weeding the monument flowers during an assigned week. They complete their work with great pride. Finally, a group of Tabor Academy students under the direction of Steve Watt and Lauren Boucher continue to assist with grounds projects on Fridays during the fall and spring months. We appreciate the efforts of all involved in maintaining the beauty of the Music Hall property.

Shaun Cormier, Facilities Director, and his team continue to accomplish any necessary improvements to the Music Hall property and building. A major project addressed in 2023 was the replacement of the entire HVAC system, completed in May. As was noted in prior years, the entire cooling system and part of the heating unit in the existing system were not operational prior to this replacement. Although this project came at great expense, it was necessary for both the integrity of the building and the functional use of the space in all seasons. On the horizon is a repair to the building's elevator, which is not currently functioning at the stage level.

There remain many people to recognize for their time and service on behalf of the Music Hall. We would like to specifically thank the Music Hall Committee, the Sippican Historical Society, Ami Milano, Shaun Cormier and his crew and finally our Select Board representative, Randy Parker.

## Report of CEMETERY COMMISSION

The Cemetery Commission oversees the care and improvements within the town cemeteries, Evergreen, Old Landing, North Marion and Hermitage Road.

We have been reviewing our rules and regulations and are waiting for approval from the Select Board. We try to maintain the plantings around headstones but if overgrown or encroaching on a neighbor's plot we ask the Department of Public Works (DPW) to trim or remove. Plantings are only allowed in front of a headstone and must be maintained by the owner. All seasonal decorations should be removed in a timely fashion or will be discarded by the town.

This past spring we planted twelve new flowering apple trees along the two main entrances at Evergreen Cemetery. The Route 6 gates were refinished by the DPW last year and are a handsome addition. We hope to continue to landscape the cemeteries and will be reseeding several areas this spring.

A separate committee oversees the Point Road Memorial Cemetery which is a woodland area (donated by the Stone family) just for cremains and is a beautiful and unique setting. Take a walk through and see for yourself.

The DPW handles inquiries and sales for all our cemeteries and Jody Dickerson and his crew do all the maintenance and mowing.

## 2023 YEAR-END REPORT TO THE TOWN OF MARION FROM THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (SRPEDD)

The Town of Marion is a member of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. Originally founded in 1956, SRPEDD (pronounced “sir-ped”) is one of 13 regional planning agencies (RPAs) across the state and one of approximately 550 across the country.

SRPEDD serves 4 cities and 23 towns in southeastern Massachusetts. Through our work, we address common issues facing the region, including economic development, growth and land use, safe and efficient transportation, environmental stewardship, municipal partnerships, community development and affordable housing, infrastructure needs, and general planning. A Commission of local mayors, selectmen, planning board members, and at-large members govern SRPEDD. Federal and state grants, local assessments, and local contracts fund our activities. In 2023, the Town of Marion paid \$1,078.50 to SRPEDD, based upon an assessment of 20.172 cents per capita. SRPEDD’s annual budget in 2023 was \$5,045,223.

SRPEDD also serves as the region’s staff for the Southeastern Massachusetts Metropolitan Planning Organization ([SMMPO](#)) and the regional Economic Development District ([EDD](#)) with the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA). In both roles, SRPEDD works with numerous partners to program tens of millions of dollars to directly invest in our region’s infrastructure and community development.

### REPORT OF PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project (PCMCP) are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 2023.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is composed of the 27 municipalities in Plymouth County and the Town of Cohasset. The Project is a regional response to a regional problem, and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

In the spring, larviciding efforts begin as water temperatures rise and mosquito larvae begin to feed. The Project ground and aerial larvicided 14,581 acres and this was accomplished using an environmentally selective bacterial agent. Upon emergence of the spring brood of mosquitoes, ultra-low volume adulticiding began on June 5<sup>th</sup>, 2023 and ended on October 6<sup>th</sup>, 2023. The Project responded to 13,655 requests for spraying and larval checks from residents covering all of the towns within the district.

The Department of Public Health (DPH) has developed an “Arbovirus Surveillance and Response Plan” for the state. The Plan creates a system which estimates the human risk for contracting Eastern Equine Encephalitis and West Nile Virus using several factors including the number of infected mosquitoes. Based on guidelines defined by the Plan, all towns in Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project started the season at “Low Level Risk” for Eastern Equine Encephalitis. Near the end of the season, Bridgewater and West Bridgewater were moved to “Moderate Risk” due to a positive mosquito sample found in Bristol County. There was no Eastern Equine Encephalitis Virus detected in the PCMCP service area this year.

West Nile Virus activity was widespread in Massachusetts. Statewide there were 6 human cases, none of them were in the district. All towns in the district started the season at low risk for West Nile Virus. However, later in the season the human risk was raised to moderate for all towns but Hull, Marshfield and Scituate. These three towns remained at low risk. As part of our West Nile Virus control strategy a total of 48,597 catch basins were treated with larvicide in member towns to help control WNV.

The Project participates in DPH's mosquito surveillance program. As part of that program we collected 99,563 mosquitoes and submitted 29,259 mosquitoes for testing. The mosquitoes were combined into 685 groups. DPH also tested 14,498 mosquitoes from the district. In all there were 0 isolations of EEEV from mosquito samples. There was a total of 17 WNV isolations from Abington, Brockton, Carver, Halifax, Hanover, Hingham, Kingston, Marion, Marshfield, Mattapoisett, Middleboro, Pembroke, and Whitman.

The health threat of EEE and WNV continues to ensure cooperation between the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project, local Boards of Health and the Department of Public Health. In an effort to keep the public informed, EEE and WNV activity updates are regularly posted on the Department of Public Health website.

The introduced mosquito *Aedes albopictus* has the potential to become a serious pest and a vector of disease. The mosquito has been present in Massachusetts since 2009. The larvae live in containers and are closely linked with human activity. They are especially associated with used tires. The Project began a tire recycling program in October 2017. During the 2023 season we recycled 4,039 tires bringing us to a total of 16,841 tires for the program.

The figures specific to the town of Marion are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of Marion residents.

**Insecticide Applications:** Our greatest effort has been targeted at mosquitoes in the larval stage, which can be found in woodland pools, swamps, marshes and other standing water areas. Field Technicians continually gather data on these sites and treat with highly specific larvicides when immature mosquitoes are present. In Marion 371 larval sites were checked.

During the summer 189 catch basins were treated in Marion to prevent the emergence of *Culex pipiens*, a known mosquito vector in West Nile Virus transmission.

Our staff treated 1,295 acres using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in June and the last in October.

**Water Management:** During 2023 crews removed blockages, brush and other obstructions from 3,075 linear feet of ditches and streams to prevent overflows or stagnation that can result in mosquito production. This work, together with machine reclamation, is most often carried out in the fall and winter.

**Mosquito Survey:** Our surveillance showed that the dominant mosquitoes throughout the district were generally *Cq. peturbans* and *Cx. pipiens/restuans*. In the Town of Marion the three most common mosquitoes were, *Culex pipiens/restuans*, *Cs. melanura*, and *Ae. vexans*.

**Education and Outreach:** Our Community Liaison, Erin Morrill, has had the opportunity to give 18 in-person presentations at local BOH's, COA's, libraries, schools, and fairs. Planning and scheduling for the upcoming season has already started with hopes of adding new

community organizations to the list. Erin has reached out to all of our school IPM coordinators in efforts to keep them up to date and in compliance with the Children and Families Protection Act. If your town is interested in setting up a presentation, please contact our office.

Our Project website is a great resource for information on upcoming meetings, the annual budget, educational information, and Project services. Announcements and important dates can be found on the home page.

## Report of MARION HISTORICAL COMMISSION

To the Honorable Select Board:

The Marion Historical Commission continues to make progress since it became active again in the fall of 2019. Our primary objective is to carry out our mission statement to identify and protect the town's historic resources.

We continue to update our webpage on the Town's website with the results of recent survey activity, including maps and inventory forms for Areas and individual Inventory Forms for significant properties. Information on current Commission activities and local preservation resources is listed on the site. Copies of said documents are also kept on file at the Sippican Historical Society and Elizabeth Taber Library for public access.

The Commission's primary goal at this time is to develop a comprehensive inventory of all historic and cultural resources in the town. Under guidance from the MA Historical Commission, standard forms, procedures, trainings and technical support are available to us.

Funded by our Community Preservation Fund 2021 grant, survey work was completed by our historic preservation consultant for the Old Landing Area, Old Depot Area, Oliver Cobb House Area, and additional properties on Wareham Street and in North Marion. Copies of completed forms were sent to current owners of surveyed buildings.

In February 2023, we hosted the second of two well-attended community presentations on a report entitled *The History of Marion's Portuguese, Azorean and Cape Verdean Community*. These reports were given by local resident Rick DaSilva. As follow-up, we cohosted with the Council on Aging and the Sippican Historical Society a series of three public workshops entitled Cape Verdean Story Hour. Held at the Benjamin D. Cushing Community Center, these sessions offered local Cape Verdean residents a chance to share their stories of growing up in Marion as well as their recollections of the Marion Cape Verdean community.

Working in partnership with the Marion Department of Public Works (DPW), the Commission held a meeting at the DePina Landing site in August. This location played an important role in the cultural development of the Cape Verdean community, especially in the 1950's and 1960's. We now hope to encourage DPW improvements to the site in 2024 for public access and benefit, including a posted description of its history.

Our 2022 Community Preservation grant is now being used for a consultant to continue the next phase of survey, which started in July 2023. Survey work is underway for historic resources on Converse and Moorings Roads, in the Delano Road area, and along Point Road and adjoining roads and neighborhoods in East Marion. Property owners were notified in advance that the survey work would take place. Completion is scheduled for Spring 2024.

We received a \$35,000 grant from the Community Preservation Fund to continue the next phase of survey and preservation planning. This project will start mid-2024.

Much concern continues to be expressed over the demolition and/or inappropriate modifications to historic properties in the town, and particularly in the Marion Village area. The Historical Commission was successful in their November 2022 request to the Select Board to appoint a Local Historic District Study

Committee. This Committee was appointed in January 2023 to explore and evaluate the feasibility of creating a Local Historic District, for which there would be a design review process for certain exterior changes visible from a public way. Local Historic Districts are the primary preservation mechanism adopted in over 100 towns and cities in Massachusetts and are demonstrated to be an effective tool in preserving an area's historic and architectural character. This process is consistent with recommendations of the 2017 Marion Master Plan. The Study Committee began its work early in 2023 and has continued through the year by hiring a consultant, completing a survey of the proposed area, and holding a public meeting in the Fall of 2023. Although the project is taking longer than originally expected, it should come before Town Meeting in Fall 2024 or Spring 2025.

Another ongoing concern has been the continued uncertain fate of the Rev. Percy Browne House, 192 Front Street, often referred to as the TenBrook House after its most recent owner. Designed by renowned American architect Henry Hobson Richardson in 1880-81, it is now owned by Tabor Academy. We have been in conversation with Tabor and will continue to work with Tabor's administration in the coming year to assure the preservation of this important landmark in a manner which suits Tabor's needs but also acknowledges its historic and architectural importance at the national level.

We continue our program of sending a Welcome Letter to new buyers who purchase properties that are of historic merit and/or are included in the Historic Inventory, offering historical background as well as information and guidance to encourage historically and architecturally sensitive renovations, should improvements be planned.

We maintain our close relationship with the Sippican Historical Society, the primary repository for archival documentation of the town's history and co-funder of many of our programs. We continue to jointly promote awareness of historic preservation objectives with guest lectures on topics relevant to Marion's past and future visual character.

A thank you to the Community Preservation Committee for their annual funding of our survey activities. The Historical Commission receives no funding from the Town, so we rely entirely on state grants and the Community Preservation Fund to support our work. Historic Preservation is a primary criteria for expenditure of Community Preservation funds.

We encourage all Marion residents to review our webpage on the Town's Website [www.marionma.gov](http://www.marionma.gov), and to contact us with suggestions for future projects or with information to share about your historic or architecturally significant property. Old photographs of historic buildings "in their heyday" are especially valuable to us as we continue to survey the entire town's resources.

## Report of ELIZABETH TABER LIBRARY

To the Honorable Select Board:

In 2023, the Elizabeth Taber Library (ETL) was grateful to team up with local organizations and community members for rewarding and insightful programming events covering a wide range of topics. Travelers shared tales and flavors from global adventures in Cuba and the far east. The Gravestone Girls led a historical tour of Evergreen Cemetery and offered practical instruction on preserving pieces of local history through artifact-safe gravestone rubbing techniques. We hosted glass blowing demonstrations and yoga instructors. We joined the Library Speakers Consortium to connect our patrons to live virtual talks with bestselling authors. Families had the chance to meet furry and winged friends with visits from Professor Bugman, Wingmasters Birds of Prey, and Pine Meadows goat yoga!

We found reasons to celebrate all year long with Black History Month displays, programs, crafts and giveaways, Pride Karaoke, Elizabeth Taber's Birthday Party, Summer Reading Program festivities, and spooky Halloween events. Our annual pumpkin decorating contest featured 45 contestants, with pumpkins donated from Fieldstone Market. Two major fundraising events were held in the spring: Our Second Annual Lizzy T Trivia Bee and our Fourth Annual Tables of Content dinner party and book talk fundraiser. Both events offered participants the opportunity to enjoy lively community driven activities while supporting the library.

This year, the Elizabeth Taber Library teamed up with local institutions to provide outreach opportunities for organizations whose members were interested in learning more about the library's offerings. We opened our doors to immersive library tours which included sharing library lore and history (including artifacts from the over 150 years of the life of the ETL) and a full rundown of our expansive range of services and collection offerings. In the winter and fall, the library worked with Sippican School's afterschool program to teach the fundamentals of 3D printing. In the summer the ETL collaborated with the Marion Natural History Museum for a neighborhood block party featuring science and dinosaur themed activities. Families enjoyed free ice cream from Oxford Creamery, fossil dig pits, an inflatable right whale, Virtual Reality adventures, and a visit from a pack of life-sized dinosaurs that roamed the grounds of the Marion Music Hall.

In response to ongoing controversies regarding censorship in the Tri-Town, the ETL established the Banned Book Club to provide the community with a format for respectful, productive conversations regarding censored literature. The Banned Book Club additionally hosted several events throughout the past year highlighting current and historical efforts to ban and challenge books. These events included *Banned In Boston*, a presentation discussing the history of censorship efforts in New England, and *Banned Books: State of the Union*, a discussion of current efforts across the United States to restrict access to library materials. During Banned Book week, an annual event celebrated by libraries nationwide that highlights the value of free and open access to information, the ETL held a Freedom to Read celebration with a special story time and book giveaways.

This year, we were grateful for the opportunity to improve our patron's library experience with major technology upgrades. Thanks to a generous private donation, the library was able to replace outdated staff computers with modern equipment to ensure a more reliable service. Our aging public computers were similarly updated, and five additional computer stations were added, including a catalog searching station. In addition to new computers and new computer station furnishings we were able to improve and extend our Wi-Fi capabilities for the benefit of the entire library. We are hoping to see even more large-scale improvements to the library in the coming year.

A major development for the ETL this year was the formation of the Friends of the Elizabeth Taber Library. This group of dedicated volunteers was established to lend support to the library by helping us to meet our annual budget goals and to promote library services and programming. This year the Friends took over the enormous task of organizing and running our annual book sales, an undertaking that has been overseen by Nita Howland, a beloved volunteer who has served the ETL for almost 30 years! The newly formed Friends expanded their fundraising efforts to include t-shirt sales, bake sales, raffle sales, and partnered with Community Veg Marion for the First Annual Marion Secret Vegetable Garden Tour. The Friends capped off the year with a month-long holiday book sale that raised thousands of dollars for the library.

Everyone at the Elizabeth Taber Library is grateful for the support we receive that enabled us to create a vibrant community center for the Town of Marion. We would like to extend our appreciation to everyone on the Board of the Marion Library Association, all our volunteers, and each visitor who finds a reason to explore the library.

## Report of MARION CONCERT BAND

## **Report of MARION NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM**

### **To the Honorable Select Board:**

The Marion Natural History Museum (MNHM) is pleased to continue providing the community with opportunities to view and appreciate the natural world through unique displays and natural history programs. The Museum continues to serve the community by hosting after-school nature programs, daytime and evening programs for adults and families, and a summer nature program for children. The Museum's 151st year proved to be an exceedingly active one.

The Museum was honored to receive a grant from the Marion Community Preservation Committee for work completed in 2023, as well as an additional grant for work to be completed in 2024. Funds from the 2023 grant were used for the repair, restoration, and preservation of the historic wooden display cases donated by Elizabeth Taber a century and a half ago; updates to the exhibit space; programming of a searchable online inventory system; and the task of inventorying the Museum's collection in the main exhibit space. Inventorying the Museum's collection continues through 2024.

Many ongoing exhibit and display updates were completed in 2023, and many more are planned for the coming year. We saw the completion of a mural featuring a NOAA Map highlighting the Marion coastline in the Museum's foyer, and a 38-foot mural representing the diminishing sizes of the critically endangered, life-size North Atlantic Right Whale, featuring a photograph by MNHM Board member, Michael J. Moore, Vet. M.B., Ph.D., an internationally recognized right whale expert. The printing of the mural was donated by Michael and Hannah Moore.

Exhibit case backgrounds were designed, printed, and installed. LED lighting now brightens the cases. Objects have been removed, cleaned, photographed, and entered into the Museum's publicly available inventory system. Now back in their cases, the objects are center stage and will soon have labels with expanded and updated content, detailing each object and including QR Codes for visitors to explore more interactive information, including photos, videos, audio, and infographics.

The 700+ pound iron meteorite known as hexahedrite IIAB, on loan from the Mineralogical and Geological Museum at Harvard University, continues to welcome visitors to the Museum and Library. This extraordinary meteorite is part of the largest mass of the Coahuila meteorite in the world. Visitors are welcome to touch this artifact and connect with time and space. The meteorite will be on loan for at least another year.

The History of the Marion Natural History Society, Part I, written by Ralph M. Wardle, Ph.D., was reformatted, and Part II was written by David Pierce. Both publications were printed thanks to the generosity of long-term board member, David Pierce. Both are available for free to members and for a small fee to non-members.

Additionally, in 2023, the Marion Natural History Museum steadfastly upheld its mission to bring engaging natural history programs and activities to the community. Under the thoughtful curation of Executive Director Elizabeth Leidhold, the Museum presented an enriching lineup of 31 programs, attracting over 420 attendees across diverse age groups and interests. The year's offerings included 19 after-school programs that combined educational enrichment with hands-on learning, 7 summer coastal explorations that connected participants with the ecological wonders of their local marine and shoreline environments, and 12 specially curated community lectures and events. These events brought regional experts to the forefront, sharing their knowledge and expertise on a range of topics from conservation efforts to the latest in wildlife research, thereby underscoring the Museum's commitment to fostering a deep connection between the community and the natural history that surrounds us.

Additionally, the Museum partnered with the Elizabeth Taber Library for a second Summer Kickoff that brought hundreds of visitors to meet life-size dinosaurs, and Delilah, a life-size Right Whale, accompanied by two scientists from Whale and Dolphin Conservation (WDC). Visitors also traveled in time and space in VR, enjoyed arts & crafts, fossil digs, science fun, face painting, and free ice cream thanks to Oxford Creamery.

In 2023, the Marion Natural History Museum achieved remarkable transformations and milestones. Program attendance, memberships, visitors, and community donations reached the highest levels in the Museum's history. For a small, venerable institution like MNHM, such robust growth is a sign of the enduring bond between the Museum

and our community. As we mark 151 years, it's evident that our legacy as one of the nation's oldest natural history museums is a testament to the unwavering support and commitment of our residents and patrons. The Museum's longevity and vitality are products of this collective dedication, reflecting a shared recognition of the importance of preserving and celebrating our natural heritage.

Our mission, to foster a deep appreciation of our natural world and to educate and engage the community in environmental science and history, has never been more vital. It is this mission that calls us to look forward, to build on the foundation laid by generations past, and to ensure that the legacy of the Marion Natural History Museum continues to thrive—potentially even with expanded hours, programs, and offerings. ## 2023 MNHM PROGRAMS

### WINTER/SPRING AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAMS 2023

**February 15 | Bird Feeders and Winter Bird Exploration with Manomet Bird Observatory:** Students explored local birds that overwinter in Massachusetts. They were given model birds to identify and information about behavior and diet during the winter months. Students made their own bird feeders and determined the best location and type of food for their feeders.

**March 1 | How to Start Your Own Natural History Collection:** We took a quick tour of some of the Museum's specimens from its beginnings in 1872 to recent donations. We covered aspects such as how to begin a collection, identifying specimens, correct labeling, and storage. The kids were free to bring their own collections from home to share with the group.

**March 15 | Naturally Artistic:** Led by artist and MNHM Board Member, Karen Alves, this session combined art and physics through the creation of right whale mobiles. Celebrating our new right whale mural, participants explored balance and physics, embodying the connection between nature and creativity.

**April 5 | Exploring Wetlands and Vernal Pools:** We took a close look at these important ecosystems and the unique role they play in our forests. We conducted several hands-on experiments involving water and soils, and took a close look at some of the animals that rely on these important habitats.

**April 26 | The Science of Tie-Dye with Dr. Dills:** We learned about the chemistry that occurs when you tie-dye an item. Dr. Dills, a Chemistry Professor from UMass Dartmouth, explained the chemical process that allows you to create your own masterpiece.

**May 3 | Amazing Arthropods with Plymouth County Entomologist Blake Dinius:** Did you know that insects and spiders make up about 77% of all animal species on the planet? And did you know that without insects, we would literally be buried in poop? We journeyed into the wonderful world of Amazing Arthropods!

**May 17 & 18 | Trip to Bird Island:** Thanks to the Marion Harbormaster's office, we were able to take two trips to Bird Island to view Common Terns and the endangered Roseate Tern. Bird Island provides a very special habitat for these animals, as well as for Oystercatchers and other birds who need the island for a safe nesting site.

**May 24 & 25 | This is Rocket Science!** We learned about propulsion and lift with MNHM Board Member, Mike Cronin. Each child had his or her own rocket with a motor to assemble and launch.

**May 31 & June 1 | Exploring Ram Island:** Ram Island, situated within Sippican Harbor, has many unique ecosystems for us to explore. Owners Michael and Hannah Moore kindly invited our group to investigate their salt marshes, rocky intertidal shore, and mudflats.

## SUMMER COASTAL EXPLORATIONS PROGRAMS

**July 7 | Seaweeds for Grades 3–6:** We met at Brainard Marsh to learn about our local seaweeds and the invasive species affecting the ecology of our shorelines. We collected and inspected the seaweed we found using microscopes and magnifiers. Each student made a seaweed pressing.

**July 14 | Amphibians for Grades 3–6:** Frogs, salamanders, and newts, oh my! We delved into what makes these animals special. At Washburn Park, we examined amphibians and aquatic invertebrates in the wetlands. Using nets in the vernal pools and ponds, looking under logs, and exploring the woods, we searched for our resident species.

**July 21 | Bird Island for Grades 2–6:** Thanks to the Marion Harbormaster, we had the chance to learn to identify the rare and special bird species that rely on Bird Island for nesting. We also learned about the efforts made to restore the island to expand its available nesting area.

**July 28 | Barrier Beaches for Grades 3–6:** We explored the significance of barrier beaches and their crucial roles in our coastal landscape. Meeting at Planting Island Beach, we investigated two examples of Marion's coastline: rocky intertidal shores and our calmer salt marshes.

**August 4 | How to Build a Wetland for Grades 3–6:** We learned that many of our region's cranberry bogs were once white cedar swamps or other types of wetlands. An abandoned bog requires assistance to revert to a wetland habitat due to water manipulation during bog creation. At Grassi Pond in Marion, we explored the geology, hydrology, and ecology of a restored cranberry bog to understand the value of diverse wetland habitats.

**August 11 | Sandy Beaches for Grades 3–6:** At Silvershell Beach, we explored our sandy beaches and salt marshes. We also visited Sprague's Pond to conduct hands-on experiments and examined the important ecological services provided by this area. Additionally, we used a seining net to catch fish and attempted to identify the species.

**August 18 | Shellfish for Grades 3–6:** Can you distinguish a bivalve from a mollusk? We visited the upwellers on Island Wharf to learn about oysters and other shellfish with Marion's shellfish warden, exploring their significant role in the bay. We also made fish print t-shirts.

## FALL/WINTER AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAMS

**September 29 | Historic Bird Island Lighthouse:** We learned about the history of the Bird Island lighthouse and heard a ghost story involving the first lighthouse keeper and his wife. We also learned about the construction of the lighthouse, and what storms nearly took it down along with all the other structures on the island.

**November 1 | Talking Terrapins:** Deb Ewing oversees a diamondback terrapin conservation area in Marion and has partnered with the New England Coastal Wildlife alliance to protect Diamondback Terrapins. Unfortunately, this program had to be cancelled due to illness and has been rescheduled for spring 2024.

**November 8 | Fall Forests:** State Forester Jim Rassman gave the kids an introduction to forests in the Fall, and how to identify some of our local tree species without using leaves.

**November 15 | Build a Bog:** We investigated how cranberry bogs were created from glacial times to now. We learned what is required to keep them healthy and productive. Every child went home with a miniature bog in a cup.

**November 29 | How Watersheds Work What is a Watershed?** We used the Museum's watershed table to experiment with how a watershed reacts to certain conditions. We used our creativity and hands-on experiments to find the answers to some of our most common issues like pollution, erosion, flooding, sea level rise, and more.

**December 6 | Whales in Our Waters:** We investigated Museum specimens to learn a little about the whales that visit our coast each year. From filtering their food to the use their teeth for larger prey. We spoke about migration patterns to relative sizes and habitats, and learned about these warm-blooded animals that visit us every year.

**December 13 | Annual Holiday Party:** We made gifts from natural and recycled materials. Students visited across several stations for a variety of crafts and activities, including snow globes, pinecone feeders, acorn figures, and much more.

## COMMUNITY/ADULT PROGRAMS 2023

**January 11 | Birding Apps for Beginners:** Justin Barrett, NHM Board member and president of the Nasketucket Bird Club, introduced the basics of popular birding apps. These apps are especially useful for identifying birds in the field during events like the Great Backyard Bird Count.

**February 1 | Winter Ducks at Silvershell Beach:** Justin Barrett guided us through Silvershell Beach areas that commonly host winter migrant birds. This bird walk welcomed participants of all experience levels, emphasizing observation, and learning in the chilly outdoor setting.

**February 15 | Winter Walk at Washburn with State Forester Jim Rassman:** The community group joined Service Forester James Rassman for a walk around Washburn Park, learning to identify various trees and shrubs by their bark and buds while enjoying a stroll through diverse habitats.

**March 22 | Naturally Artistic for Adults:** Karen Alves led a workshop on using smartphones for nature photography, covering the basics from composition to lighting and textures, and settings on your phone.

**March 31 | Old Growth Forests of Massachusetts:** David Orwig, a senior ecologist with Harvard Forest, shared insights into Massachusetts' old-growth forests, discussing their definition, locations, significance, and threats. This program was partially funded by the Marion Cultural Council.

**April 5 | Butterflies of Southeastern Massachusetts and the Cape:** Joe Dwelly, known as the "Butterfly Man," shared knowledge about local butterfly species, offering advice on attracting them to backyards and raising awareness about their role in biodiversity.

**May 10 | Butterflies 2.0:** This session, a continuation of the previous butterfly-focused event, delved into the swallowtail family and other common butterflies, discussing the plants that support them and how to attract them to our gardens.

**June 24 | Summer Kick-off Celebration in Partnership with the Elizabeth Taber Library:** The MNHM and ETL hosted a summer kick-off at the Music Hall, featuring life-size dinosaur and Right Whale models, with accompanying scientists from Whale and Dolphin Conservation discussing Right Whale biology among other activities.

**May 17 | A Potential Win for Endangered Whales and Fisheries:** Dr. Michael Moore discussed technology adaptations for bottom trap retrieval that reduce risks of whale and turtle entanglement, potentially allowing fishing in areas otherwise closed for conservation.

**August 17 | Ospreys: Revival of a Global Raptor:** Alan Poole, an associate of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology with over 35 years of studying ospreys, discussed these raptors known to visit Buzzards Bay, in an event co-hosted with the Sippican Lands Trust.

**October 21 | Woodland Walk for Mushrooms:** This mid-autumn hike focused on finding fruiting mushrooms, discussing their anatomy, identifying features, and differentiating between a few beginner-friendly edible mushrooms and their non-edible look-alikes.

**November 15 | History of Cranberry Bogs:** USDA soil scientist and MNHM Board member, Maggie Payne explored the origins and development of cranberry bogs, from their glacial beginnings through their geological history to the present.

**November 29 | MNHM Merian Mobile Project:** Karen Alves invited the community to paint butterflies for a mobile that will hang above the museum's butterfly case, as part of the Museum's exhibit space makeover, an ongoing project welcoming community participation.



## **Report of OLD ROCHESTER COMMUNITY TELEVISION**

To the Honorable Select Board:

During 2023 Old Rochester Community Television (ORCTV) returned to our pre-Covid-19 routines, practices, and schedules. ORCTV continued expanding upon our efforts to broaden our abilities to serve the Tri-Town area through community media.

Over the course of this past year ORCTV, filmed and broadcasted over 200 government related meetings, workshops, forums, and candidate spots for the Town of Marion. This included meetings of the Select Board, the Planning Board, the Conservation Committee, the Zoning Board of Appeals, the Open Space Acquisition Committee, the Finance Committee, the Marion School Committee, the ORR School District and Joint School Committees, the Marion Marine Resources Commission, the Affordable Housing Trust and the Pathway Committee as well as the Local Historic District Committee's special public forum. ORCTV recorded and broadcast interviews for the Finance Director's position and the Select Board's Comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan presentation at the Town's request. The ORCTV staff also recorded the Town's Annual Meeting in May and the Special Town Meeting in October as well as candidates for office spots and the Annual League of Women Voters Candidates' Night. In April of 2023, ORCTV recorded the Stewards of Community Open Space meeting and during the month of January the station's staff recorded a series of interviews along with a presentation of the final choice for the position of Town Administrator.

In December of 2023, Executive Director Robert Chiarito oversaw the installation of a recording system at the Marion Town House. The Town requested the system to provide the capability once again for in person meetings to be broadcast over the station's Marion Government Channel live from the Conference Room of the Town House. Marion now has three conference rooms outfitted with recording equipment with the capability to be broadcast live on the Marion Government channel. These are in the Town House, in the Police Station's meeting room and at the Marion Music Hall.

As we do each year, ORCTV provided coverage of many Marion annual town events for the community's public channel. This included the Memorial Day Ceremonies and Procession, Veterans' Day Ceremony, the Independence Day Parade, fireworks and festivities, the Annual Halloween Parade, the Buzzards Bay Music Festival at Tabor Academy and the 2023 Village Stroll and the Holiday Concert at Sippican School during the Christmas season.

ORCTV continued its many partnerships with local civic groups and member producers this past year. The staff filmed events and programs with the Marion Council on Aging through their guest speaker program and the Marion Museum of Natural History guest lecturer series as well as their after school and summer youth educational programs. The staff recorded plays, art openings, exhibits, concerts, and the Art in the Park show for the Marion Art Center. During the past year ORCTV continued its work with St. Gabriel's Episcopal Church to livestream and broadcast the congregation's weekly church services. Marion resident Janine Hunt continues to be a regular contributor with her series 'The Janine Hunt Experience' which began production in 2017. ORCTV station member/producer Judith Rosbe and the Sippican Historical Society continued producing episodes of the group's long running Oral History Project. The series has been in production since 2013 with each installment featuring the story of a Marion resident in their own words. ORCTV continued its years long collaboration with the Sippican Historical Society's Leslie Piper to record its speaker series program and their annual meetings.

The partnership between the Old Rochester Regional School District and ORCTV continued to grow during 2023. This past school year the staff of ORCTV worked with over 500 students and school district staff members in video production training classes and workshops at the elementary school level. The ORCTV Educational Outreach program continued its work with Sippican School through the collaborative Junior Reporter program. Working together each week Sippican School instructor Chelsea Lawrence and ORCTV's Elementary School Outreach instructor Samantha Lawrence collaborate to teach video production classes. This year, the school's program was in such great demand that there were twice as many interested students as there were positions in the program. To accommodate all students who were interested in participating, the program was broken down into two half year sections rather than one year long program.

The ORCTV/Old Rochester Regional High School (ORRHHS) video production program is now in its eighth year. The student produced news magazine 'Bulldog Weekly' highlights student life and activities at the high school and features weekly segments from Principal Mike Devoll and Athletic Director Christopher Carrig during each 30-minute episode. The show continues to be entirely written, filmed, and edited by ORRHHS video production students. ORCTV also continued to work closely with the ORR Athletic Department filming regular season and playoff games throughout the school year. In addition to working with the ORRHHS athletic department, the staff and student interns also recorded and livestreamed many other ORRHHS school events such as plays, lectures, concerts, the annual promenade, and pep rallies. Both the ORRHHS and Old Colony Regional Vocational Technical High School Commencement ceremonies were broadcast live as were those of the local elementary schools and the Junior High School. The students and staff also worked with the ORR School District to bring local viewers a number of school concerts, award ceremonies, holiday events and school assemblies and school committee meetings throughout the year from each of the District's six schools. ORCTV staff members work with the ORR School District's web designer to provide content for the District's websites. This material includes video, aerial drone shots and photographs from ORCTV productions of school events.

As part of both our Educational TV program and our mission to serve our station members, the ORCTV staff taught camera and editing classes and held production workshops to teach residents how to create programming for our local audience. Through our social media outlets and our online video on demand platforms these vital productions continue to reach over 10,000 people per week in addition to our thousands of subscribers who view programs on the station's five channels via their cable tv packages. As we continue to stress since our inception, Old Rochester Community Television takes the community portion of our name very seriously. Helping our members tell the story of their hometowns through television productions which they have been creating since we first went on the air in 2006.

ORCTV has nearly completed a new podcasting/radio studio offering our audience more ways to participate in community media. The project's construction began during the summer of 2023 and should be completed by spring of 2024. During 2023, the ORRHHS Athletic Boosters broke ground for a press box at David S. Hagen Memorial Field, ORRHHS's main outdoor sports stadium. ORCTV is still on track to install a permanent production facility in the press box to provide state of the art broadcasts for the community of most events that occur at the stadium. At the time of this report there is no completion date for the press box, however, ORCTV has purchased the equipment and will be able to install it as soon as construction on the project is completed.

Over the course of the year 2023 ORCTV cable-casted 8,300 hours of programming on our public channel, over 6,570 hours of programming on our educational channel and over 7,000 hours of programming on Marion's Government Channel. ORCTV has always been proud to call the Tri-Towns our home and to serve our community as your local cable access media center. We look forward to our continued service to the Town of Marion for the foreseeable future.

## **Report of SCHOOL DEPARTMENT**

To the Honorable Select Board:

### **Introduction**

Old Rochester Regional School District and Massachusetts School Superintendency Union #55 serve the towns of Marion, Mattapoisett, and Rochester. Dedicated educators and staff serve the three communities of Marion, Mattapoisett, and Rochester and the four school district structure, working collaboratively to provide a high quality education for our students preparing them for post-secondary success. The support provided to the school-system from the three towns from a resource standpoint helps ensure the ongoing success of our students through strong educational programming and by providing safe learning environments.

The 2022-2023 school year marked the final year of the school-system's strategic plan known more commonly as Vision2023. For a five-year period, beginning in 2018, the school community has worked diligently to towards the desired outcomes articulated in Vision2023. By following a clear strategic plan to guide the direction of the school-system, the stakeholders within the school community were able to work collaboratively on common objectives and initiatives on behalf of the Tri-Town's students and families.

The progress achieved has positioned the school-system to adopt its new strategic plan and begin the ongoing work of meeting our students' educational needs into the future. With Vision2023 coming to an end, the strategic planning process begun in the 2022-2023 school year to ensure the school-system's next strategic plan was in place for the coming school year.

Ultimately, the mission of our school system remains steadfast to inspire all students to think, to learn, and to care.

As you read this report, you will see examples of our students' achievements, staffing and program changes, as well as signs of the structural improvements that have taken place in our buildings to upgrade learning spaces, technology infrastructure and safety.

### **Strategic Plan Overview**

Vision2023 was created in the spring of 2018 by a steering committee with the help of focus groups from all three towns. The steering committee narrowed the scope of the work to three priority areas; social and emotional learning, global awareness, and 21<sup>st</sup> century learning. The anchoring outcome or theory of action is:

**IF WE ...**

provide all students with life and career skills, learning and innovation skills, and technology skills, by integrating these skills into a rigorous and relevant curriculum,

**AND**

develop and consistently utilize evidence-based approaches and strategies that foster the social and emotional well-being of students to promote their success,

**AND**

create a school district environment that broadens our students' leadership skills, understanding and appreciation of multiculturalism, diversity, and global awareness by building relationships to establish a broader worldwide network, inspire all students to think, to learn, and

**THEN WE WILL ...** to care.

have provided our Tri-Town students with 21st-century academic skills, strengthened their social and emotional competencies and prepared them to be engaged global citizens.

### Strategic Plan - Year Five

During the 2022-2023 school year, school stakeholders (i.e. students, teachers, staff members, families, school leaders, and school committee members) worked hard to complete the desired outcomes identified in the fifth year of the strategic plan. ### **School Leadership**

During the 2022-2023 school year, Mr. Michael S. Nelson continued to serve as the Superintendent of Schools, supported by Mr. Howard G. Barber, Assistant Superintendent of Finance and Operations. Sharlene Fedorowicz joined the team as the Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning. Mr. Craig J. Davidson remained as the Director of Student Services. In addition, Mr. Eugene Jones, Director of Facilities, Mrs. Jill Henesey, Director of Food Service, and Mrs. Doreen Lopes, Early Childhood Education Coordinator continued to serve our schools in their capacities.

At the school building level – our administration teams remained relatively constant from the previous school year. The Marion School District welcomed back Ms. Marla Sirois, Principal and Mr. Peter Crisafulli, Assistant Principal. As for the Mattapoisett School District, Mr. Kevin Tavares became the Principal of Old Hammondtown School and Dr. Linda Ashley was appointed as the Principal of Center School after the retirement of Mrs. Rose Bowman. Mr. Michael C. Devoll, Principal, and Mrs. Vanessa Harvey, Assistant Principal, returned to lead the Old Rochester Regional High School during the 2022-2023 school year. At the Junior High School, Silas Coellner, Principal and Ms. Kelly Chouinard, Assistant Principal, both also returned. Ms. Lauren Millette also joined the secondary team as the Director of Guidance. Lastly, the Rochester School District continued to be led by Derek J. Medeiros, Principal and Mr. Charles West, Assistant Principal.

### **School Buildings**

The Facilities Department worked hard with each town and within each building to ensure safe and secure educational facilities. Security in all schools remained paramount. We have added cameras, communication equipment and door access upgrades across the District. Phase replacement of facility equipment and machinery conducted throughout the four districts extending our capability to continue the high material condition of our buildings and grounds.

At Rochester Memorial School, we completed the security/surveillance upgrade, which improved the overall safety by providing enhanced surveillance and access to our school and grounds. A new kitchen serving line and washing machine for the food service department was installed. We completed Phase 1 of HVAC recommissioning to improve energy efficiency and air quality and installed Variable Frequency Drives (VFD's) on boiler pumps to maximize efficient and cost saving operation of the boiler/heating system. All mandated yearly inspections and tests were completed. We continued routine maintenance on all facility machinery and equipment to ensure proper operation and reliability.

At Old Rochester Regional Junior and Senior High Schools, we completed the running track surface restoration and track field improvements, including irrigation. This restoration allows the students, staff and community to enjoy a modern track and field to enjoy outside athletics. We replaced the entire baseball backstop and bullpen area providing a safe and functioning backstop and dugout area for players and observers. The press box construction started as well. We conducted routine maintenance as well as minor repairs conducted on all facility machinery and equipment to ensure proper operation and reliability.

At Sippican Elementary School, the rear playground construction started, swing banks were installed and Engineered Wood Fiber (EWF) surfacing laid. The Sippican Garden Project was started. We also completed Vinyl Composition Tile (VCT) flooring resurfacing in all 1<sup>st</sup> grade rooms and the School Resource Officer's

office, which was funded by Capital. The main office roof top unit (RTU) was overhauled utilizing Capital funding as well. We completed complete restoration in room 208 after the May 23<sup>rd</sup> sprinkler activation. Lastly, we conducted routine maintenance and minor repairs on all facility machinery and equipment to ensure proper operation and reliability.

At Center School, a complete HVAC upgrade utilizing Capital Improvements ensured optimum operation of our HVAC/BMS. We conducted an overhaul of the roof top unit (RTU) supplying the administration suite. Outside, we resurfaced the basketball court asphalt and properly lined for age appropriate regulation. Lastly, routine maintenance and minor repairs took place on all facility machinery and equipment to ensure proper operation and reliability.

At Old Hammondtown School, we executed a phased replacement of the food service kitchen serving line along with a phased replacement of the clothes washer and dryer. Faulty sewage pumps and floats were placed and we completed repairs to the side playground. Also on the exterior grounds, we replaced two basketball hoops and striped for age-appropriate regulation. Lastly, routine maintenance and minor repairs were conducted on all facility machinery and equipment to ensure proper operation and reliability.

**Student Services and Special Education**

In Marion, Mattapoissett and Rochester, students who receive special education services range in age from 3 to 21. For our youngest students our integrated preschool programs, Project Grow, provides services for preschoolers who are eligible for special education in their least restrictive environments. There are some students at this age level that also come to their local schools to receive therapy on an appointment basis based on their individual needs.

Students that are elementary age and receive special education services may be eligible through mild learning, language and/or social emotional disabilities, developmental delays or more significant disabilities (multiple, intellectual, autism). Services are determined through initial/triennial evaluations and annual review of individualized education plans. The complexity of certain disabilities may require services that occur after school or during the summer vacation period. Students that are at junior high, high school and 18-22 program level additionally receive services that focus on transition where school-based teams assist in surveying career and post-secondary education goals and begin to work with adult agencies for students that are entitled to these support services. There is a community-based component to our Life Skills and Transition programs to facilitate skill development in the area of transition (job exploration, daily living, and community experiences).

During the 2022-2023 school year, the percent of students with disabilities within our school districts were as follows:

The average percentage of students with disabilities (SWD) was 18.75%, which falls below the state average.

Students in grades 9-12 have had the opportunity to participate in Unified Sports. In the fall, athletes and partners played basketball with local area unified sports teams. In addition to both home and away games, highlights included senior recognition presentation, jamboree of all local teams hosted by Dartmouth High School and a game against a team comprised of our local police departments. In the spring athletes returned for Track and Field where they demonstrated their skills in the areas of javelin, shot put, long jump and track. Selected students were invited to the state tournament. Selected students from grades 2-12 and the transition program also participated in the Tabor Academy Unified Sports day. Tri-Town students along with Tabor Academy students participated in events such as soccer, volleyball and bocce to name a few. After participating in the sports activities, all students are recognized for their efforts.

Professional development was provided to staff district wide on two full days and four half-day afternoons. Responsive classroom training was provided to new teachers and staff. School Nurses focused on professional development topics that included the school nurse's role in the development and review of policies and procedures. Early Childhood staff focused on equitable support for children in early childhood programs and kindergarten readiness. Special education staff (special education teachers, paraprofessional staff and related service providers) participated in topics that ranged from helping traumatized children learn, Google training, Medicaid billing, creating therapeutic classrooms for all learners, mentorship, data collections and supporting students who may become dysregulated.

The Office of Student Services collaborated with Southeastern Massachusetts Educational Collaborative (SMEC) to provide community wide events for students and families. The Community Talks series continued in the fall with a virtual presentation by Dr. Robert Brooks entitled "Nurturing Resilience in Our Children and Teens During Challenging Times". In the winter, Ms. Sarah Ward presented "Powerful Strategies to Help Children Develop Independent Executive Function Skills".

Our Special Education Parent Advisory Council (SEPAC) hosted meetings and workshops for our Tri-Town parents. Workshop topics included "Basic Rights: Evaluation and Eligibility" and "Effective Communication".

Within the Tri-Town educational community staff, students, families, and community members continue to work collaboratively as a team to provide high quality educational opportunities for our students. Our student services staff are dedicated to providing support that develop the whole child and develop a sense of belonging. Our student services staff are innovative, caring and committed to providing exceptional educational services.

### **Finances**

Federal and state grants continue to offset staffing in all four school districts, as well as provide staff development for targeted student needs including social and emotional learning, language-based learning disabilities, and students with significant and complex needs. Grants also offset a percentage of preschool programming. Finally, the continued investment in providing special education services within the neighborhood schools enriches the quality of teaching available to all students, improves the school culture and ultimately results in students with disabilities and their families maintaining a higher level of independence.

**The School Budgets**

Each fiscal year the Old Rochester Regional School District and Massachusetts School Superintendency Union #55 receive grant funding that are identified in various grant categories. These categories are recognized as Entitlement (or Allocation) and Competitive and Targeted grants, which are received from Federal, State or Private Sources.

**Entitlement grants** are funds allocated to school districts from federal or state sources based on predetermined criteria such as demographics, economic indicators, income, or specific characteristics. Recipients of entitlement grants automatically qualify for the funding without having to compete with others through an application process. These grants are often distributed to meet the needs of a particular group or population, and eligibility is typically determined by meeting specific criteria set by the grantor and are less competitive than that of competitive grants. Examples of these grants awarded are the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act for \$714,339, Title I Part A for \$152,795, or the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act - Early Education and Care grant for \$18,257 are included in the \$1,020,794.

**Competitive grants** are funds provided by governments, foundations, or other organizations through a competitive application process. In this model, multiple individuals or entities submit proposals or applications for a specific project or program, and the grant is awarded to the most deserving or promising proposal. The selection criteria often include factors such as the feasibility of the project, the qualifications of the applicant, and the potential impact of the proposed initiative. Competitive grants are intended to encourage innovation, efficiency, and effectiveness by fostering healthy competition among applicants. Examples of these grants awarded are the Summer Acceleration Academies for \$160,000, Math Acceleration Academies for \$250,000, Development and Expansion of High Quality Summer Learning for

\$200,000, and Accelerating Literacy Learning through High Quality Instructional Materials for \$466,000. These grants are included in the \$1,315,009 total.

**Targeted grants** are designed to address specific issues or target particular populations or regions. These grants are distributed to meet the unique needs of a defined group or to support initiatives that align with specific goals. The focus is on achieving specific outcomes or addressing particular challenges within the identified target area or population. Examples of these grants awarded are CTE Secondary and Postsecondary Programs — Perkins Reserve for \$5,000 and Rural Energy for America Program for \$50,185. These grants are included in the \$55,185 total.

**Private grants** refer to financial assistance or funding provided by non-governmental entities, typically private foundations, corporations, or individual donors. These play a significant role in supporting a wide range of initiatives and organizations, contributing to positive social, environmental, and cultural impact. Private grants are derived from the resources of private entities or individuals. Examples of agencies providing these grants awards are the Tri-Town Foundation, Boston College and Cape Cod 5. These source type of grants received a total of \$28,113.

The following are some of the Federal and State Competitive Grants from one time funding received in Fiscal Year 2023 that may not be available next fiscal year:

**Summer Acceleration Academies Grant** is to fund the implementation of a specific strategic initiative, the Acceleration Academies, during summer 2022 to help accelerate the learning of students most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Acceleration Academies are intended to supplement, not supplant, programming an applicant is already planning to offer over the summer, therefore the Summer Acceleration Academy program should take place between the end of an applicant's currently planned summer school programming and when the applicant's teachers return for the 2022-2023 school year. The focus areas are Early Literacy Academy for rising kindergartners, rising 1st graders, and rising 2nd graders and Math Academy for rising 3rd graders, rising 4th graders, rising 8th graders, and rising 10th graders.

**Math Acceleration Academies Grant** is to fund the implementation of a specific strategic initiative, the Acceleration Academies, to help accelerate the learning of students most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Funds from this grant can be used to support the implementation of math focused Acceleration Academies for students in grades 3 through 10. The Math Acceleration Academies must take place during the February and/or April school vacation weeks of the 2022-2023 school year.

**Development and Expansion of High-Quality Summer Learning Grant** is to fund support for the development and expansion of high quality, comprehensive summer learning opportunities and partnerships in districts to address both the academic and social-emotional impacts of COVID-19 on students.

**Massachusetts Lead for Literacy Institute Grant** is to support educators and administrators to create a literacy plan aligned to the [multi-tiered system of support model](#) (MTSS) for grades K–5. Through this collaborative Network, districts will create K–5 literacy plans that include instructional leadership responsibilities, literacy priorities and goals, [evidence-based instruction and intervention](#), assessment, and professional learning.

**Accelerating Literacy Learning through High Quality Instructional Materials Grant** is to equip schools and districts with the high-quality core instructional materials needed to accelerate literacy learning, particularly as schools recover from extended closures and students require rich instructional support to accelerate their learning. It will support schools and districts with 50% of the purchase price of new core instructional materials for literacy, and up to the entire cost of the initial professional development for educators.

**Enrollment**

The October 1<sup>st</sup> enrollment totals in the Old Rochester Regional School District and Massachusetts School Superintendency Union #55 Districts are showing a fluctuation from year to year. Enrollment in Massachusetts public schools has fallen nearly 4 percent — or by roughly 37,000 students — since fall 2019, a decline that is attributed to shifting demographics, housing costs, and fallout from the pandemic. It is important to note that our homeschool numbers are almost at the same level they were prior to COVID-19. In 2019, we reported 24 students districtwide. In 2020 we reported 92 students K-12 and in 2021 there were 31 students K-12 that were homeschooled. In 2022, 30 students in grades K-12 were homeschooled.

Although a high percentage of the elementary school students K-6 are enrolled in the Tri-Town Public Schools, there is some movement to independent and parochial schools from grade seven and a more significant movement to independent, parochial, and vocational schools, after the eighth grade. ### Union Agreements

### **2022-2023 Academic Performance**

At Old Rochester Regional School District MA Superintendency Union #55, we are extremely proud of our school community's efforts and achievement on the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS). The 2023 school year was the second year for the full MCAS administration since 2019. Grade 10 students in 2022 had not taken an MCAS assessment since they were in grade 7 in 2019.

Trends from the state show that the slide in scores due to the pandemic has halted and recovery is underway. Although state science achievement scores decreased slightly across Massachusetts, English Language Arts (ELA) and math achievement scores are stable or increasing. Now that we are on the road to recovery, the state realizes we have significant ground to make up to reach pre-pandemic achievement levels. The state is using the 2019 MCAS results, the last pre-pandemic assessment, as a goal to improve student achievement toward our road to recovery. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) acknowledges that the last few school years have not been normal and therefore predicted the learning loss due to the pandemic.

The ORRSD and MA Superintendency Union #55 are proud to share that the majority of our scores consistently trended above the state average in achievement and recovery. In many cases, our recovery path well exceeded the state, and we are accelerating toward or above the 2019 MCAS score level. The dedication and hard work by the students and educators in the district did not go unnoticed.

Although we are pleased with our scores and recovery, we pride ourselves on a continued effort to focus on the rigorous standards and ways to refine and enhance our teaching and learning to guide our instruction. We are extremely proud of our school community's achievement and success.

We continue to cultivate a sense of belonging and partnership with families and students creating rigorous instructional delivery and scaffolding to meet the learning needs of our students. At our local school committee meetings this past fall, the Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning along with the Principals, conducted MCAS presentations on the scores and results.

The following data in this Annual Report discusses an overview of both MCAS and Accountability results. The MCAS results are for diagnostic and improvement purposes to support planning for the district and school buildings. The assessment is computer based and focuses on critical (independent) thinking abilities, application of knowledge, and ability to make connections between reading and writing.

MCAS Achievement levels are broken down into four categories ranging in increments of 30 from 440-560. A score of 500 or above is considered "meeting expectation" and a score of 530 or above is "exceeding expectations" which are both passing scores. Scores under 500 are not considered a passing score in MCAS. These include the categories of "Partially Meeting Expectations" or "Not Meeting Expectations".

In terms of accountability status, this is the first year DESE is providing full accountability determinations for schools since 2019. DESE has provided an accountability percentile for schools in the state of Massachusetts. An accountability percentile ranges between the numbers of 1 and 99. The percentile score is an indication of a school's overall performance relative to other schools with similar grades and is calculated using multiple accountability indicators from contiguous years, such as MCAS data from 2022 & 2023. Although percentiles are calculated for schools, they are not calculated for districts. The table

below shows an at-a-glance overall performance of each school according to these accountability measures. Overall, our schools performed well and are classified as “Not requiring assistance or intervention”.

In our school districts, we continue to improve learning by utilizing data, including MCAS and other assessments, to analyze, inform, and guide instructional strategies. We are proud of the persistent endurance and growth of our students, as well as the dedication and hard work of our teachers, staff and administrators. Further, cultivating a sense of belonging in addition to collaborating with families and students creates strong connections that support and enhance the educational experience for our students. Each school’s individual MCAS performance is discussed further in this report.

## Rochester Memorial School Performance

Rochester Memorial School is made up of pre-k through grade 6 students. Rochester Memorial School students continue to perform at a high level in all subjects.

Students at Rochester Memorial School in grades 3 through 6 achieved an average standard score very close or above the 500 threshold consisting of 494 for grade 3, 496 for grade 4, 492 for grade 5 and 508 for grade 6 in ELA. The school performed 3% better than the state average in ELA.

Average math scaled scores for Rochester Memorial School students were 498 for grade 3, 500 for grade 4, 494 for grade 5 and 507 for grade 6. The school performed 6% better than the state average in math.

The grade 5 average score was 501 in science. Grade 5 is the only elementary grade that takes the science MCAS. The school performed 6% better than the state average in science.

## Sippican School Performance

Sippican School serves students pre-k through grade 6. Sippican School students continue to outperform the state at a high level in ELA, Math and Science.

Students at Sippican School in grades 3 through 6 achieved an average standard score close to or above the aforementioned 500 threshold consisting of 499 for grade 3, 496 for grade 4, 499 for grade 5 and 508 for grade 6 in ELA. The school performed 4% better than the state average in ELA.

Average Math scores for Sippican School students were 502 for grade 3, 504 for grade 4, 500 for grade 5 and 504 for grade 6. The school performed 13% better than the state average in math.

The grade 5 average score was 497 in science. Grade 5 is the only elementary grade that takes the science MCAS. The school performed 3% lower than the state average in science.

Students at the Mattapoisett schools in grades 3 through 6 achieved an average standard score very close to or above the 500 threshold consisting of 498 for grade 3, 501 for grade 4, 505 for grade 5 and 511 for grade 6 in ELA. The school performed 19% better than the state average in ELA.

Average math scaled scores for Mattapoisett schools in grades 3 through 6 were 498 for grade 3, 505 for grade 4, 509 for grade 5 and 508 for grade 6. The school performed 18% better than the state average in math.

The grade 5 average score was 508 in science. The school performed 23% better than the state average in science.

The grade 8 average score was 499 in science. Grade 8 is the only junior high school grade that takes the science MCAS. The school performed 9% better than the state average in science.

### Old Rochester Regional High School Performance

Old Rochester Regional High School serves students grades 9 through 12 from the towns of Marion, Mattapoisett, and Rochester.

Students at the Old Rochester Regional High School in grades 9 through 12 received average standard scores above the 500 threshold consisting of a score of 509 in grade 10 in ELA. The school performed 21% better than the state average in ELA.

Average math scaled scores for Old Rochester Regional High School were 506 grade 10. The school performed 15% better than the state average in math.

The grade 9 average score was 502 in science. Grade 9 takes the biology MCAS at the high school. The school performed 3% better than the state average in science.

### Old Rochester Regional SAT Performance

A total of 206 SAT exams were taken by students during the 2022-2023 school year. The Mean Score for Evidence-Based Reading and Writing was 573 which outperformed averages at both the state (563) and national (534) levels. In Math, the mean score for the district was 565, which outperformed the averages at both the state (558) and national (524) levels.

### Advanced Placement Coursework

One hundred eighty-five students took advantage of the variety of Advancement Placements courses offered at Old Rochester Regional High School in the 2022-2023 academic year. These 185 students took a total of 332 AP exams, meaning many students took multiple AP courses at the same time. Many students chose to get a leg up on college level coursework while still in high school. AP exams are developed by the College Board. With a scoring system of 1 through 5 on the AP exam, if a student earns a 3, 4, or 5, many higher education institutions offer college credit. Students enter college with credits already earned, placing them ahead in their degree aspirations. We are proud that many students take multiple AP courses and exams while at the Old Rochester Regional High School.

With AP Scholar awards, the AP Program recognizes high school students who have demonstrated outstanding college level achievement through their performance on AP exams. The AP scholar designation is granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams. Old Rochester Regional High School had an impressive 95 students who earned this distinction. We are very proud of the robust participation of our students in Advanced Placement courses. ## **Sippican Elementary School Principal's Report**

The school year began with an enrollment of 403 students in grades PreK through grade six. We embraced the normal that this school year brought to us and the excitement was palpable!

### **Staffing**

The 2022-2023 school year brought a few new faces to Sippican Elementary School including:

At the conclusion of the school year, Mrs. Penny Sullivan retired after about twenty years as a teacher at Sippican Elementary School in the Special Education Department. Her strong advocacy for the children of the school is irreplaceable.

### **Curriculum and Staff Development**

Sippican Elementary School worked closely with the HILL for Literacy to conduct a literacy needs assessment and to purchase of a new core literacy curriculum aligned with the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) high quality instructional materials resources to best meet the learning needs of our students. As a result, Sippican Elementary School adopted the new, high-quality literacy curriculum called IntoReading by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt for grades K-6. Sippican Elementary School was awarded a \$152,000 grant from DESE to assist with the procurement of the new literacy curriculum.

In the sciences, grade 6 was in the second year of piloting the DESE approved OpenSciEd curriculum funded through a grant. Teachers were provided professional development to implement two new modules last year for a total of four units in the curriculum for the 2022-2023 school year. Grade 5 was awarded a grant at the end of the year to start piloting two units of the OpenSciEd for the 2023-2024 school year. Funds from the grants awarded were used to purchase science materials and resources for the classroom, as well as provide professional development to teach the science units.

Grade 3 teachers and students have been supported by a grant through Marion Institute Grow, Farm to School project to learn how to grow and cultivate food. This year-long project that starts for the 2023-2024 school year will allow students to understand the importance of gardening and growing food. Funding included the purchase of soil, garlic, and garden boxes. Students will learn the importance of cultivating soil, planting garlic bulbs, caring for plants as well as learning about the important pollinators that pollinate the flowers in gardens.

Students in grades 3 through 6 at Sippican Elementary School took the MCAS last spring in English Language Arts (ELA), math and science and achieved average standard scores either close to or above the 500 threshold. In ELA, the school outperformed the state average by 4%. In math, students excelled,

surpassing the state average by 13%. Last, grade 5 is the only elementary grade that undergoes the science MCAS. The school performed slightly lower than the state average by 3%.

With the new core literacy curriculum, ELA teachers have been receiving targeted instruction on implementing the new IntoReading core curriculum and the Science of Reading. In addition, our educators that teach science have been participating in OpenSciEd instructional training. The district is providing training support in these areas to ensure teachers receive high-quality professional development necessary to successfully implement new curriculum and provide targeted instructional delivery methods to meet student needs.

### **Highlights Across the School**

The school year began with our traditional open house on the night before school starts. Many Sippican Elementary School families attended, and the faculty was excited to welcome the students back. Sippican Elementary School's clinical team, Ms. Francisco, Mrs. Ennis, and Mrs. Emmons provided a warm welcome and many resources for families at the open house.

In December, our collaboration with the Marion Police Department brought a Marion Police Satellite Office to the school. We are grateful for their continued contributions to our school safety and ongoing partnership.

During this school year, 20 students in grades 5 & 6 participated in two workshops with the Project 351 Playbook Initiative under the leadership of two Juniors, Sara Kroll and Jaymison Gunschel. Following the workshops, the students met with Mrs. Lauren Millette, Guidance Director, and provided ideas for the 2023-2024 school year, including participating in additional opportunities to gather with student influencers from Rochester and Mattapoisett to develop leadership skills and promote positivity in their respective schools.

Music and band students performed throughout the area during the school year at events such as the Halloween Parade, the Christmas Stroll and the Memorial Day Ceremony and Procession among others. The immense support of the community for our students is appreciated!

Kindness Crew worked hard throughout the school with student involvement and promoting positive school culture. They hosted a hat, mittens, and toy drive in the winter, and painted a mural in the school as well. The Junior Reports continued to collaborate with ORCTV on school happenings. Both of these groups of students assisted in running our All School Meetings throughout the year, which include families.

Other school highlights included a Science Fair showcasing student projects, an Art Show showcasing student artwork and welcomed artist Bren Bataclan, and numerous Library activities. We also enjoyed Vocabulary Day, Field Day, and the Senior parade when ORRHHS seniors from Marion returned and walked the building. Some poems from our 6th grade students were featured on the website of the Massachusetts Reading Association's for their annual poetry contest with one winning honorable mention!

District-wide, principals and administration worked together to develop improved communication strategies for families, align initiatives among all the schools and support students at all grade levels. We also began preparations and developing our next strategic plan, Vision 2028. Parents, guardians, teachers and staff, along with administration developed the plan following the Planning for Success model.

### **Community Connections**

Sippican Elementary School continued to be highly supported by the Volunteers At Sippican Elementary (VASE) members who tirelessly enhance the student experience. A new "Character Counts" initiative started for all grade levels. Each teacher will be given a designated number of Character Coupons. Over the course of the year students were recognized for demonstrating our school characteristics - respect, responsibility, and kindness - in exceptional ways with a coupon for a book from our Character Counts display. The book options change over the course of the year, and coupons earned are displayed prominently. This project, dedicated to past principal Lyn Rivet, is made possible with initial funding from VASE and the ongoing generosity of the Braitmayer family. VASE also continuously updated our bulletin boards throughout the school, hosted events and experiences for students such as the Halloween Party, the Holiday Shop, Toe Jam Puppet Band, New Bedford Ballet, Marion Occupational Program, a family movie night and staff appreciation lunches! VASE also supported a field trip for each grade level.

Fire Safety month welcomed Firefighter Faria who shared safety tips to all grade levels. AnchOR events returned this school year as well. In collaboration with VASE and the Marion Police Department, a fun spaghetti dinner/bingo night was enjoyed by many of our families and district administrators. AnchOR also returned to hosting the annual egg hunt this year.

We are grateful for the on-going support of the larger community in Marion. We have continued to collaborate with ORCTV, the Marion Scholarship Committee, Tabor Academy, the Marion Art Center, Marion Historical Society as well as the library. These groups support our students in many ways throughout the school year.

### **Conclusion**

The 2022-2023 school year brought back a sense of normalcy for our students. We are happy to have helped our students to think, to learn and to care. As always, we are grateful for the support of the community. We hope you follow our website and Facebook page to stay up-to-date with Sippican Elementary School happenings.

## **Old Rochester Regional High School Principal's Report**

### **Our Towns**

Our school serves three southeastern Massachusetts towns: Mattapoisett, Marion, and Rochester. All three towns have maintained their charm through careful and thoughtful community planning. Marion and Mattapoisett are quaint, close-knit seaside communities. Rochester has a more rural landscape surrounded by scenic farms, cranberry bogs, pine forests and freshwater ponds. Residents are proud of their school systems and have been very supportive in passing legislation to ensure its continued success.

### **Our School**

The 2022-2023 school year featured a student body made up of 633 students, including 71 students attending Old Rochester Regional High School (ORRHS) through the School Choice Program. Our student body resides in the communities of the Tri-Town: Marion, Mattapoisett, and Rochester. Through the School Choice Program, the school was able to welcome residents of the following communities to our school: Acushnet, Fairhaven, Lakeville, New Bedford, and Wareham.

The Class of 2023 saw 168 seniors graduate on June 3, 2023. The hard work and determination of these young scholars will not stop there as they earned themselves 594 college acceptances to 149 universities and colleges across the country. In this graduating class, 73% of the students plan to attend a 4-year college, and 7% plan to attend a 2-year college. Two graduates will be entering the Armed Forces of the United States. Eleven graduates will enter the workforce/engage in apprenticeship. Forty-eight members of this graduating class were inducted into the National Honor Society, sixty-one graduates received the John and Abigail Adams Scholarship, and 53 of the graduates received scholarships from a variety of 131 state and local organizations.

Graduates will be attending institutions across New England such as Brown University, Boston College, Bentley University, Northeast Maritime Academy, Massachusetts Maritime Academy, College of the Holy Cross, Dean College, Curry College, Endicott College, New England Institute of Technology, Worcester Polytech Institute, Massachusetts College of Pharmacy & Health, University of New Hampshire, University of Rhode Island, Keene State College, UMass Boston, UMass Dartmouth, UMass Lowell, Emmanuel College, Merrimack College, Mount Holyoke College, Providence College, Suffolk University, Wentworth Institute of Technology, University of New Haven, Vermont State University, Salve Regina University, Rhode Island College, Simmons University, Mass College of Art & Design, Quinnipiac University, Roger Williams University, Smith College, Stonehill College, Western New England University, Plymouth State University, Northeastern University, University of Connecticut, and Sacred Heart University. The most well-attended New England colleges amongst these graduates include the University of Massachusetts Amherst and Bridgewater State University.

Across the country, ORRHS will send graduates to American University, Baylor University, Coastal Carolina University, Colorado School of Mines, Clarkson University, College of Charleston, Florida State University, Florida Institute of Technology, Franklin Pierce University, Rochester Institute of Technology, George Washington University, Iona University, Monmouth University, Montana State University, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, St. John Fisher College, Hawaii Pacific University, Elon University, The Catholic University of America, University of South Carolina, University of Delaware, North Carolina State University, Vanderbilt University, and the University of Utah.

This year, the most popular anticipated college majors include Engineering, Finance, Business, Criminal Justice, Education, Sports Management, and the Health/Science fields including Nursing. We are proud of the accomplishments of the Class of 2023 and wish them well as they represent Old Rochester in their future endeavors.

### **Our Faculty**

Of the 61 faculty members at ORRHS, 78% have their Master's Degree and 3% have their Doctoral degree. The school has a 14.5 to 1 student-to-teacher ratio.

### **Accreditation**

Principal of Old Rochester Regional High School in Mattapoisett, Massachusetts, Michael Devoll was pleased to report that the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, voted for continued accreditation for Old Rochester Regional High School at their April 2019 meeting. The New England Association of Schools and Colleges, founded in 1885, is the oldest accrediting agency in the country and is recognized by the U.S. Department of Education as a reliable agency to award accreditation to New England Schools. The Association is a voluntary accrediting agency of more than 2000 public and independent schools, colleges and universities, and vocational, technical, and career institutions. Of these, approximately 630 high schools, middle/high schools, and PreK-12 schools have been accredited through the Association's Commission on Public Schools.

### **Debate Team**

The Old Rochester Regional High School Debate Team had a successful year in 2022-2023 within the Eastern Massachusetts Debate League (EMDL). After two years of online "Zoom" debates, debaters were pleased to return to in-person debates. Two tournaments were held at Old Rochester Regional Senior High School. This season the debaters argued the following resolution: Resolved The United States Federal government should substantially increase its security cooperation with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in one or more of the following areas: artificial intelligence, bio-technology, and cybersecurity. Strong debate performances were made by Juniors Eva Hartley and Jacob Hadley, Jamison Gunschel, and Theo Jacobsen. The Old Rochester Regional Varsity Affirmative Debate Team was the 3rd highest-ranked four-person team in the league in the Eastern Massachusetts Debate League. Jacob Hadley was the highest affirmative speaker in the league. Alden Cole-Viera was a top Varsity Negative Speaker. Novice Debaters Sophia Bouley and Scarlet Sylvia had a highly ranked first season. In 2022-2023 the Debate Team is arguing the following resolution: Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase fiscal redistribution in the United States by adopting a federal jobs guarantee, expanding Social Security, and/or providing a basic income.

### **Drama Club**

During the 2022-2023 school year, the Drama Club produced two main stage performances. In the Fall, we performed *Alice and Wonderland* on November 17 - November 20. With over 60 students involved in the production, it was a fantastic turnout. We had over \$12,000 in ticket sales over the production weekend. In the Spring, we performed *Once Upon A Mattress* on March 30 - April 2. With over 60 students in the production, we were able to collect over \$10,000 in ticket sales. Within the musical we had local musicians serving in the pit band during all four performances. With help from the Tri-Town community, both productions raised over \$4,000 in advertising of local businesses. All ORRHS Drama Club performances

were well attended and had many returning tri-town community members. For both the fall and spring, the drama club was able to host a Senior Citizens show on the Wednesday of tech week. These shows were well attended by the local community and brought in donations for the local food bank. The Drama Club performs *Romeo and Juliet* in the Fall of 2023 and *Little Shop of Horrors* in Spring of 2024.

### **Class of 2026**

The Class of 2026 made great strides in coming together as evidenced by their work on the homecoming skit. The class anticipates and is planning big for next year's program. Immediately after the homecoming effort, the class held the first of two extremely successful fundraisers. With the generous donation of two tickets to see a Boston Celtics' game, the class sold raffle tickets and was happy to see our own School Resource Officer win. On the heels of that success, a second very successful fundraiser was held in conjunction with The Inn at Shipyard Park in Mattapoisett. Students and their families dined in and took home meals where a portion of the proceeds benefited the class. The class advisors are working on exciting new plans with class officers.

### **Mock Trial**

The Mock Trial Club returned to in-person competitions in January and February while competing in turn as both the plaintiff and defense in a simulated civil case involving a wrongful death lawsuit following an aviation stunt that ended in tragedy. Seniors Caitlin Collier and Sam Williamson returned and gave strong performances as attorneys. Junior Ella Caesar also performed strongly in the attorney role, and the team was joined by junior Liam Yurof, Sophomore Eden Dupre, and Freshman Austin Scully in the witness roles, as well as Freshmen Alex Fiano and Makenzie Crowley, who took on attorney roles. All students performed incredibly well, showing great skill and adaptability throughout the season. This year marked one of the strongest overall performances by the team in recent memory, while just missing advancement to playoff competition. In the 2023-2024 season, the team will return to competitions in Fall River District Court, rather than in school classrooms.

### **Music**

During the 2022-2023 school year, the Music Department had eight students participate in the Southeast District Music Festival. So far in the 2023-2024 school year, we have had five students accepted to and participate in the District Festival, as well as one student recommended to audition for All-State. This past December, the Music Department had a successful Winter Concert and performance trip to Faneuil Hall in Boston. We have already held auditions for the Spring Musical, and rehearsals began before the holiday break.

In May 2023, the Concert Band and Chorus returned to the Great East Music Festival. The Chorus received a Platinum rating, and the Concert Band received a Gold rating. We plan to return to the Great East Music Festival this Spring. The 2023 FORM Concerts were well attended and supplied solid funding for our Senior Scholarships.

### **DECA**

ORR DECA prepares emerging leaders and entrepreneurs for careers in marketing, finance, hospitality, and management. DECA is open to all students who want to know more about business and the professional world, as well as those who simply enjoy traveling and meeting new people. The 2022-2023 school year

was a great one for DECA, as our club welcomed many new members, traveled to new places, and reached great levels of competitive success. In January 2023, we took a bus to Hyannis for our first competitive conference of the year. At this competition, our students competed very strongly, with 17 students advancing to the next level of competition—the State Career Development Conference (SCDC) in Boston. At SCDC, our members also competed well, with 6 members making it to the final level of competition at the International Career Development Conference (ICDC) in Orlando. It is worth noting that this year we had the most ICDC competitors in ORR DECA’s history. Most recently, in January of 2024, our club traveled to Hyannis again to start the competitive season. Of the 20 members in attendance, 18 will be advancing to SCDC in March, and 7 additional members will proceed directly to SCDC through a written business report. In total, 25 students from ORR will be participating in SCDC this year, with high hopes for competitive success. Overall, ORR DECA has seen membership growth, competitive achievement, and networking opportunities in 2023 and the start of 2024.

### **National Honor Society**

During the 2022-2023 school year, the Old Rochester Regional chapter of the National Honor Society (NHS) worked to promote the tenets of leadership, scholarship, service, and character both on and off campus. Our tutors have worked with students throughout the district through our virtual tutoring program while our education initiative worked with elementary school students on various creative projects throughout the year. Our members also came together to collect and deliver much-needed supplies for the New Bedford Women’s Center and the Boys and Girls Club.

Through positivity and mental health initiatives, our NHS members also worked to create a positive and supportive atmosphere on campus and within our organization. After competing in the Honor Bowl with other SCC schools, two of our members founded Trivia Thursdays. These popular NHS-sponsored Bulldog Block sessions were open to all students. Our members also took part in the New Bedford United Way Youth Day of Caring during which they worked in Mattapoisett to prepare the YMCA for summer camps.

### **Class of 2025**

The Class of 2025 continuously pursued fundraising throughout the 2022–2023 academic year in preparation for future senior activities. To begin the year, the class sold Bulldog umbrellas and insulated bags throughout the fall. In November, the class held a Chipotle dine-out night in addition to a cookie dough fundraiser. Moving into the holiday season, the class organized a Parents’ Night Out for kids K–6, where the children did winter crafts, played games, ate snacks, and watched *The Grinch*. In the spring, the class organized a student-versus-teacher basketball game. In May, the calendar raffle became an annual event, and the council and class searched for donations from local businesses and families. Overall, the class worked hard to make 2022–2023 a successful year of fundraising.

### **Environmental Club**

Environmental Club meets every Tuesday after school and consists of about 8 students regularly. This year we have done some campus garden maintenance, cleaned up trash around campus, recycled paper, cans, and bottles from classrooms, and cold stratified pollinator seeds for campus gardens and community gardens. A group of Club members also volunteered for the Salty Soiree, helping the Mattapoisett Land Trust (MLT) offer families a beautiful way to gather. Our BIG project this year has been learning about and beginning the control/eradication of the invasive phragmites on campus. We were visited by Colleen

Andrews of the Mattapoissett Land Trust and Brandon Faneuf from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection. Students wrote a plan of eradication and submitted it to the MLT and State. We have begun to understand aspects of the Wetlands Protection Act and are removing invasive weeds from a retention pond from campus.

### **Student Newspaper: Paw Prints**

Our Paw Prints student newspaper has experienced excellent growth over the course of the last year. We currently have two excellent Sophomore editors and a crop of younger writers eager to step up. Our current leadership has found a cost-effective solution to use Canva for the newspaper layout. Not only does it spare extra expense, but the paper has produced some of the most beautiful layouts in recent years. Additionally, we have been able to use some Sophomore project-based writing to supplement the work produced by the regular staff.

### **Science Fiction and Strategy Club**

This year marked additional growth for the Science Fiction Club and a responsible group of student leaders who have worked to make the club open and welcoming to all new members. There are both group and individual activities to meet the needs of each member; we also offer bi-monthly game nights for longer-form Sci-Fi gaming that we are unable to complete during weekly after school meetings.

### **AFS Club**

The AFS Club empowers students to become globally engaged citizens by delivering meaningful intercultural experiences that provide the knowledge and skills needed to help create a more just and peaceful world. AFS is open to all students who enjoy traveling and meeting new people. We were able to kick things off in October with our Annual Halloween Pumpkin Carving Contest. In November, we hosted our Annual International Dinner where we invited the Southeastern Mass International student delegation. The students on the scholarship committee presented slideshows of their countries and educated our club students about their cultures and daily life. The AFS club was able to travel in December to New York City for a visit to The Museum of Natural History, Rockefeller Center, and Times Square. We were able to bring back our domestic Cultural exchange with Rio Vista High School in California. Our club students were able to travel to the San Francisco Bay Area to school and visit local cultural attractions. The ORR AFS students in return hosted 21 students from Rio Vista High School here at ORR, showing them how our school functions daily, the architecture of the Newport Mansions, our World Champion Patriots/Revolution's Hall of Fame at Gillette Stadium, and several attractions and eateries in Boston.

### **GSA Club**

The ORRHS GSA had a very successful year advocating for education in our district to create a more inclusive community. Over the course of four presentations, our GSA leadership, Alia Cusolito and Nathan Correia, provided JHS staff training on LGBTQ+ issues, including basic education on terms and identities, trans students support, and inclusive curriculum. Throughout the year, the GSA fostered conversations about community care by prioritizing mental health discussions and welcomed school community members to meetings to continue conversations about what is affecting our students. In March, our GSA president, Alia Cusolito, organized and spoke at the March For Queer & Trans Youth Autonomy in Washington DC, and our students also attended workshops hosted by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

### **Community Service Learning**

The 2023-2024 school year began with the excitement of seeing returning members as well as welcoming MANY new members' energy and commitment to give back to our Tri-Town community. Community Service Learning (CSL) offers yearly volunteer opportunities and always enjoys adding new ones so students can participate on their own. The club meets once a week after school. The CSL co-advisors, Karen Browning and Andrea Moniz, help to advise students as they take on student leadership roles on various community service projects that are new and ongoing. For the 6th year, under the leadership of our students, the CSL Club collected 384 new pairs of socks for their "SOCKTOBER" event in October. It was another huge success, and the socks were donated to The Women's Center in New Bedford. As October ended, the CSL Club turned its focus to our December group event in collaboration with Toys for Tots and the Tri-Town police departments, for our "Stuff a Cruiser" event. We were pleased this year as all three town police departments were represented and Santa stopped by to greet everyone! The CSL club was able to collect 124 toys for local children. We appreciate the generosity of our Tri-Town residents.

Among these group volunteer activities, CSL has had several individual volunteer opportunities brought to the group by students and led by students, such as volunteering on weekends at Damien's Pantry and the Mattapoisett Museum.

We are very excited about new events that our members have initiated on their own for this school year: Assisting at the East Over Farm for the Buzzards Bay Bike Ride in October; Veteran's Collection Drive for the Veterans Transition Home in New Bedford; "One Warm Coat Project" to be donated to Gifts to Give; and we have collaborated with the Junior High School as well as Sippican School for the first time. Other new programs are visits to Gifts to Give once a month, Kindness Week, and "Women United Wash and Read Program", where we collect children's books to be donated to laundromats.

The CSL Club has also been informed of opportunities brought from the community, such as the Mattapoisett Land Trust (story walks), The Friends of the Mattapoisett Bike Path (tour de Creme bike ride and "Bikes for All" program - and we now have a student representative on the board), and at the Mattapoisett Library (crafts and used book sales). For our third year, the CSL Club has continued a wonderful connection with VASE from Sippican School in Marion volunteering in the After Class Enrichment (ACE) Homework Help.

The club will plan a "beach cleanup" in the spring, as well as a school-wide clean up outside (trash as well as pruning branches and mulching in the memorial gardens). We will cap off our successful year in May of 2024, where the club will honor students who have submitted their community service hours that have earned them the "President's Volunteer Service Award", an award where students earn either a gold, silver, or bronze medallion medal depending on their age and the number of their volunteer hours, along with a signed letter and certificate from the President of the United States, thanking them for their community service.

### **Class of 2024**

As the first "mask-free" year in their high school history, the Class of 2024 started the year off by working closely with the Student Council to coordinate the annual Homecoming dance, class skit, and pep rally. As

part of the tradition, the Junior class decorated their hallway with SpongeBob themed props and accessories and created a fun skit complete with choreographed dances and music. Throughout the year, the Class of 2024 ran several fundraisers including a Spike Ball tournament, a restaurant night at Nick's Pizza, making homemade cookies, and selling chocolates from Dorothy Cox. In the spring, the Class of 2024 was the first class to ever host a mattress fundraiser which brought in community members from many local towns and cities. Their efforts raised over \$4,000 for the class. In addition, the class participated in the Neediest Family fundraiser and organized the annual Junior semi-formal dance. In June, the class elected new officers and senators and began to plan for senior year.

### **Student Council**

During the 2022-2023 school year, Student Council (STUCO) continued in its mission to promote positive school spirit and support students and activities within the school community. STUCO started the school year by organizing and running elections for the Class of 2026. After hosting another very successful Club Hub in the media center for the whole school in October, STUCO E-Board and senators attended the fall SEMASC Leadership Conference at Duxbury High School. Without missing a beat, STUCO once again collaborated with the Community Service Learning Club and their Socktober sock drive while organizing and hosting a well-attended Homecoming Dance.

From the proceeds raised through the Homecoming ticket sales, STUCO was once again able to help various clubs and organizations fund activities and initiatives throughout the school year. Clubs that received funding from STUCO in the 2022-2023 school year included Cultural Club, BIPOC, DECA, Music Appreciation Club, Tea Club, and AFS.

STUCO remained busy throughout the year, including raising over \$1,200 for the annual fundraiser for the neediest families and hosting the end-of-year ice cream social for the entire school in December. In February, STUCO members performed random acts of kindness throughout the school community during kindness week and brought back the traditional Class Olympics before February break.

The year culminated with STUCO supporting the Class of 2023 and their Safe Prom initiative and awarding the annual STUCO "Unsung Hero" Scholarships to three deserving seniors from the Class of 2023, who each received a one-time scholarship of \$500 for going above and beyond.

All in all, it was another successful year of student leadership development, community service and giving back to the school community.

Once again, the Old Rochester Regional High School proved to be first-class and continued the school's history of excellence. Students and staff congratulated the following staff members for their work at ORRHS as they moved on at the close of the school year: Becky Okolita and Caroline Cervera.

Upper Cape Cod Regional Technical School foundation enrollment, as of October 1, 2022 consisted of one hundred ninety-three (193) students from Bourne, one hundred eighty-eight (188) from Falmouth, twenty-six (26) from Marion, one hundred forty-eight (148) from Sandwich, and two hundred thirty-eight (238) from Wareham. The school also has a self-sufficient adult Licensed Practical Nursing program with both full-time and part-time day and evening programs available to students. Due to the success of quality career and technical education garnering praise on regional, statewide, and national fronts, the interest in attending Upper Cape Tech is increasing while the number of school age children is decreasing.

Upper Cape Tech continues to expand its offerings for adults and other out of school individuals. Adult tuition students, specialized afternoon and evening occupational programs, and summer programs are additional to the 793-pupil school day enrollment. Upper Cape Tech continues to offer valuable cost-effective services to its communities via its day and evening programs. During this fiscal year, 847 adult students were enrolled in evening courses.

At Upper Cape Tech, students may choose Automotive Collision Repair, Automotive Technology, Carpentry, Cosmetology, Culinary Arts, Electrical, Engineering Technology, Environmental Technology, Health Technology, Horticulture, HVAC, Information Technology, Marine Technology, Plumbing & Heating, or Veterinary Science.

Another unique offering for students at Upper Cape Tech is the cooperative employment program which allows qualifying juniors and seniors to work for employers in their trades on alternating weeks during their shop time. In Fiscal Year 2023, 210 students had cooperative employment placements earning over

\$1,175,000.00 collectively, marking it the most lucrative year on record for UCT co-op students. Upper Cape Tech boasts the highest percentage of students participating in cooperative employment of all the technical schools in the Commonwealth.

Students spent a great deal of time on projects in the communities this past year. Carpentry students assisted in the construction of cabins at Bourne Scenic Park, a sidewalk canopy for the Council on Aging building in Marion, a garden shed roof for the Sandwich Community Garden and docks for the Falmouth Harbormaster. Automotive Collision students performed body work on vehicles for the Bourne Department of Public while Horticulture students assisted the Sandwich and Wareham Garden Clubs with fall garden cleanups and plant sale set ups. Marine Technology students serviced and repaired the fire boat for the Onset Fire Department. Finally, Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning students installed new air conditioning units for the Sandwich American Legion.

In this fiscal year, construction began on a storage building for Environmental Technology. Upon completion of the storage building, work will begin on a new building to house the Environmental Technology program. This project is the result of a \$2.5 million Capital Skills grant award. The majority of the work on the buildings will be done by staff and students in the construction trades. Additionally, the doors to the newly constructed Engineering Technology building opened at the start of the school year. The relocation of this program to a separate building allowed the original Engineering shop area to be renovated into two academic classrooms and a lecture area. Finally, during this fiscal year work began on the construction of two additional athletic fields to accommodate our growing number of student athletes and athletic offerings.

Upper Cape Tech staff and students are able to undertake much of the maintenance of the building and grounds, along with monitoring the facility's complex ventilation and heating, saving thousands of dollars in outside labor costs. Additionally, significant savings were again realized this past fiscal year as a result of the solar canopies in the staff and student parking lot. The canopies resulted in almost \$98,000 in net metering credits in fiscal year 2023. The district also earned revenues of nearly \$59,000 as a result of a power purchase agreement with Future Generation Wind.

The Regional School District Committee also extends its appreciation to the many advisory boards that assist us in developing and maintaining educational programs, various town and school officials who support our efforts, and school staff members. It is the combined effort of all of these individuals that has enabled the success of the school and its graduates for the benefit of our communities. We look forward to your continued support.

SCHOLARSHIP EDUCATION FUND COMMITTEE**

To the Honorable Select Board:

The Scholarship Education Fund Committee was established under Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 60, Section 3C and adopted by Town Meeting in April 1994. There are two portions of the committee, the Scholarship portion, and the Education Fund portion.

The Scholarship portion of the committee awards scholarships to graduating high school Marion residents pursuing education beyond the secondary school level. Since its inception, the committee has made scholarship awards to over 100 students. The application criteria are based on financial need, character, academic passion, scholastic record, extracurricular activities, and involvement in community affairs. The committee received many qualified applications in 2023. Narrowing down and agreeing on the recipients was no easy task. The number and size of the awards depends upon the amount of donations received each year. The committee is very pleased to announce that for 2023, three recipients were each awarded \$500.00, and are as follows: Paige Fuller, Kira Sarkarati, and Sarah Wyman.

The Education Fund portion of the committee aids the Sippican Elementary School with supplemental funding for needs that are not covered through regular budgeting. For 2023, the committee reviewed the proposal made by Mrs. Marla Brown, Sippican School principal, and approved her recommendation to support three areas, totaling \$1,675.00. These areas included, "One Book One School", Vocabulary Day, and the AnchOR Spaghetti Supper evening. The committee gave \$375.00 toward "One Book One School" to provide a particular book to each classroom at the school. For Vocabulary Day, \$1,000.00 was allocated for photography and materials. This allowed Mrs. Brown to continue the school's long-standing and beloved tradition of providing photos to participating families. Lastly, \$300.00 went toward AnchOR's Spaghetti Supper and Bingo evening of fun, which was held on March 2, 2023. AnchOR is a staff-based group that strives to connect the school community with the community at large.

Allocations from this committee are made possible through the generosity of Marion taxpayers and other interested people who have contributed to the fund. We are grateful to the many people who have donated, both through the Marion Town House, and through request slips included in their tax bills. Contributions in any amount are always appreciated and are fully tax deductible. To the Honorable Select Board:

Marion Cultural Council's (MCC) number one priority is to promote access to MCC funds to projects that will directly improve the quality of life for those living in and around the Town of Marion by utilizing funds provided by the Massachusetts Cultural Council. In Fiscal Year 2024, Marion was provided with \$5,500.00 to allocate to promote excellence, inclusion, education, and diversity in the arts, humanities, and sciences, fostering a rich cultural life for all Marion residents.

Using data from our latest community input survey (July 2022), MCC prioritizes the following when making decisions using the top responses from Marion citizens: 1) The grant will directly benefit a significant amount of Marion's residents, 2) Community-wide gatherings/festivals, 3) Performing arts, 4) Visual arts, 5) Educational Programs and field trips for local schools, 6) Nature and environmental education projects/STEM-related projects, 7) Projects celebrating local history and cultural diversity, 8) Public Art (such as sculptures, etc.), 9) Art education, and 10) Education/lectures.

The Annual Town Meeting was called to order by Moderator Brad Gordon at 6:45p.m. on May 8, 2023 at the Sippican School Auditorium. Invocation was by Rev. Richard Woodward of the First Congregational Church of Marion. Tellers sworn were Christopher Berg and Henry Norweb, III. The Moderator noted the presence of a quorum and reported that the Warrant for the meeting had been posted and returned in accordance with the law.

**Article 1.** Motion was made and seconded that the Town vote, in accordance with General Laws Chapter 41, Section 108, to approve the following Compensation Schedule for elected officials, effective July 1, 2023:

Judy Mooney was recognized for her service of 20 years to the Town as Finance Director, and the new Finance Director Heather O'Brien was introduced. The Moderator noted the presence of a quorum and reported the Warrant for the meeting had been posted and returned in accordance with the law.
